MASONS IN HISTORY ...

ERNEST BORGNINE (1917-)

Stage and screen actor, who in 1956 won an Oscar for his performance in *Marty*. Borgnine served ten years in the U.S. Navy during WW II and studied acting under the GI bill.

He hit legitimate stage with the Barber Theater in Virginia and later in New York. He played the lead in *Born Yesterday* and that led him to Broadway in *Mrs. McThing* with Helen Hayes. He also did some 200 radio and TV shows.

In Hollywood, his big break came when he was cast in *From Here to Eternity*, opposite Frank Sinatra, Deborah Kerr and Burt Lancaster.

He is a member of Abingdon (Virginia) Lodge No. 48 and the Scottish Rite Valley of Los Angeles, California. He received the 33 degree from the Southern Jurisdiction in 1983.

WORDS OF WISDOM FROM THE WEST

On November 18th, I, with several other J.W. Barkley officers and members, attended North Olmsted Lodge #741 and witnessed their vote regarding the proposed merger with John W. Barkley Lodge. We were very honored and pleased to see a 100% vote in favor of the proposal.

This marriage (or merger) has all the necessary ingredients of a very successful relationship in that all parties come to the table with something to offer.

Each of these bodies will gain by the increased membership, which will ultimately add to the choice for officer material. The Temple Board will gain by the combining of Tuesday and Wednesday night into one night, thereby opening one night for another body to meet, increasing the rental income of the building.

In 1994, Laurel Lodge #657 and O.N. Steele Lodge #621 united to form John W. Barkley Lodge #621. The #621 was the number of O.N. Steele Lodge. As a member of the former Laurel Lodge, I had always considered Laurel as one of the better Lodges with a strong officer base, but with the combining of forces, I see John W. Barkley as an even better and stronger Lodge than either before. Our attendance is usually 10% and better, which today is a strong sign in any organization. was written, but examples of this can be found throughout history. Rather than go through the past, I would like to take this opportunity to see how this can apply to us today, and how our Grand Master's theme – "Freemasonry: A Blueprint for Life" – ties into it.

Our Grand Master, Most Worshipful Brother Steven J. Krekus, has detailed a program that focuses on seven basic goals for Lodge success. They are: 1) Ritual Proficiency, 2) Lodge Operations, 3) Family Activities, 4) Youth Groups, 5) Masonic Information, 6) Charitable Giving, and 7) Community Participation. We are very good in several of the areas, but can improve in a few of them. I'll focus on the Community Participation aspect, because it also incorporates the Mission Statement with the Grand Master's Program. The Grand Master's Award requirements for Community Participation are:

- 1. Each Lodge shall assist a part of the Community (City, Township, and/or School Board) in a project.
- 2. Assist in or sponsor events such as Relay for Life, Alzheimer's Walk, Community Homecoming, Habitat for Humanity, construction of a new park or playground, Spring cleanup.
- 3. Brothers are encouraged to serve on Boards of their community (Council, Township Trustees, Commissions, School Boards, etc.)
- 4. Present a scholarship to a high school senior in the name of the Lodge or a Brother that is or was a leader in the community.
- 5. Purchase an ad in the school athletic event, chorus, or play program.
- 6. Conduct a Child Identification Program.
- 7. Donate stuffed bears to the Police and/or EMS for distribution to children at accident and crime scenes.
- 8. Raise money and donate bullet-proof vests, defibrillators, smoke vision glasses, or other needed implements to safety forces.
- 9. Participate in the Ohio Reads Program.

We will already comply with requirement #2 when we have a booth at the North Olmsted Homecoming, which, for years, North Olmsted Lodge has been doing. Similarly, we are in compliance with #4 as both of our lodges have presented scholarships for years, and will continue to do so. We will talk to the city of North

Olmsted to see what we can do by way of helping on a community project, and to see if anyone is serving on a Board, or is willing to do so. We will certainly purchase an ad in the high school program(s). We will have to look closely at items #8 and #9 to see what we can do in those areas. I have the information that we need to participate in items #6 and #7, and it is as follows: We can provide the Child I.D. Kits to a local school at no cost to them. We merely need to contact the Superintendent or Principal to see how many kits they may need; order them from the Cleveland Masonic Center at a cost of \$.50 each; and present them to the school. The Ohio "Freemasons Care Bears" can be given to the local police and/or EMS to give to a child at an emergency scene. The "Bear" transfers the child's attention away from the situation they may be in. The cost is little and the rewards are great. The "Bears" only cost \$6.00 each and can be ordered from the Cleveland Masonic Center. I have the order forms for both of these worthwhile projects, and I hope to see us implement them in the very near future.

I think it is very obvious how participating in the Grand Master's blueprint program will help us to become more active in our community, improve our community and ourselves, reaffirming "our dedication and unity to become *involved* citizens who have a strong desire to preserve the values that *have continued* and *will continue*, to make America great." I look forward to working with all of you to achieve these goals, which ultimately will make us even stronger.
