Thanks to WB Parzyck for completing the electrical work in the OES closet. The closet will be renovated by the OES Chapter to include new cabinets and organizers. Once this is completed, the closet will hold both OES and Rainbow paraphernalia. This will make way for clearing out the closet/cabinets in the Fellowcraft Room.

All this is leading up to the renovation of the Fellowcraft Room and the resurrection of the Craftsman's Club. We will look forward to getting this project started early next year.

You, too, may be responsible for planning and/or preparing dinners and/or refreshments, hosting Table Lodges and Hospitality Rooms and the like. The list goes on. I am sure I have only touched on some of the things that are required of him who sits in East.

I only hope that the road which I, and many of you, have traveled thus far has properly prepared me for the upcoming year and the tasks that lie ahead.

Masonic Light – Are You Using Your Talents?

I attended my Church recently and had the privilege of hearing one of the best sermons I had heard our Pastor ever give. His talk concerned a gospel reading in which the great teacher used a parable to convey an important message.

The parable went something like this. Three servants were each given talents (coins) by their master and according to the abilities he saw within them. To the one with the most ability he gave five talents. To another he gave two talents. And to the one with the least ability he gave one talent. Two of the men went off and invested their talents trading and bartering. The one with the least ability went and buried his talent in the field. When the Master returned several months later, he gathered the men together to see what they had done with the talents. The one with the five talents produce another five talents. The man with the two talents produced two extra talents. To these two men, the Master heaped praise for using their talents to gain more. The final man told the lord that he was afraid to lose his single talent so he buried it in the field and at once brought it forth to return to the Master. The Master decried this man as lazy and slothful and sent him away.

The Pastor proceeded to explain to us how God gives all of us talents to use as we see fit. He does not tell us what to do with these talents but leaves us on our own. At the end of our days, when we present ourselves to Him in glory, He will take an accounting of how we used our talents. Did we squander them or not use them to improve ourselves or others? Did we use them to help others and ourselves?

Freemasonry teaches us similar things. Our degrees and lectures reveal the talents within us. They are there. We only need to have them revealed to us. To be steered in the right direction. Our Craft makes this easy for us.

“Of these, the greatest is Charity“. Charity is an innate talent we all possess. My youngest daughter possessed this ability from the beginning. She would be munching on a cookie or some grapes and would always offer some to whoever was sitting near.

Now and days, our world becomes more and more materialistic. We must all have the latest gadget or the sleekest car. We have three times as many choices in the supermarkets than we had only ten years ago. More stuff to buy and possess. This stifles our Charity, because we need our money to buy things.

Are we using our talents to improve ourselves? The Charity of Freemasons is well known. Each meeting we are usually donating to some cause. Our donations usually involve a passing of the Hat after the meeting. I am always amazed how deep our brothers pockets can be.

This is a prime example of using your talents to make gains. This is what the Great Light was speaking to us about. Use what the Grand Architect gave you for good. He gave you an abundance of talents to do good for yourself and those around you.

Even if you don’t possess many talents, use what you have. Remember the servant who only had two talents. He used those few talents to make two more.

The Feasts of St. John

Among American Freemasons there are two festivals in the Masonic calendar. The Feast of St. John, the Baptist, is celebrated on June 24th and the Feast of St. John, the Evangelist, on December 27th.

The two dates fall at the time of the summer and winter when the sun attains its greatest north or south declination when it apparently stands still for a short time before turning in its course. These are known as the summer and winter solstices.

Why is it that Masonry has chosen these two men as patrons? Why are Masonic lodges dedicated to them? Why do Masons hold celebrations in their honor each year? Were the Saints John Freemasons?

St. John, the Baptist

Why did the Freemasons choose St. John, the Baptist, as patron? One would suppose that they would name some outstanding person. But, St. John, the Baptist, was a humble man, a plain man who held, above all, his obligations to God and, with almost unbelievable steadfastness, met martyrdom. He continually preached repentance - and virtue - and humiliation.

Yes, the early freemasons chose well in selecting such a man as St. John, the Baptist, as a patron of Freemasonry!

St. John, the Evangelist

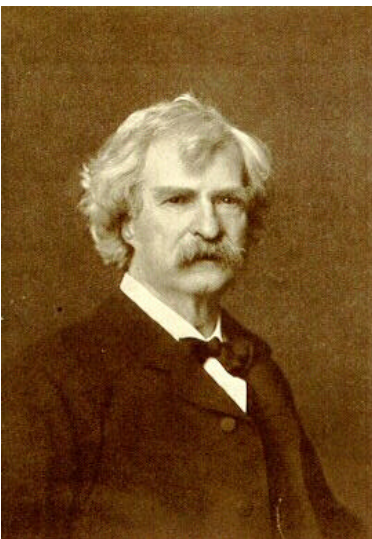
For a long period only St. John, the Baptist, was patron saint of Freemasonry. It was not until after the 16th century that St John, the Evangelist, was also adopted as a patron. The "Old Charges" of Freemasonry speak of St. John, the Evangelist, as a "Saint of the Craft." He was constantly admonishing the cultivation of brotherly love. Of all the gospels, The Gospel of St. John is the most Masonic for the central theme is **LIGHT**. It portrays God as "the Light of the World."

Lodges Dedicated to the Holy Saints John

Lodges then came to be dedicated to the Holy Saints John and it is interesting to note that the early Masons were called "St. John's Masons" or "St. John's Men."

It matters not whether the two Saints John were actually members of the Masonic fraternity. But they have been called the patrons of the fraternity down through the ages because they have exemplified the principles of Freemasonry in their daily lives by their deeds and their words. These two humble men did not engage in any of the pomp and glory of the world. It is because Masonry regards the character and internal qualifications of a man - not the exterior appearances - that these two men are fittingly called the patrons of this great fraternity. They possessed those internal qualifications that made the **TRUE MAN**. Masonry honors them above all others for they were the living examples of the Golden Rule, the practice of virtue, love for their fellow-men and love for their God.
