Masonic Light

I opened the newspaper the other day and the headlines screamed out at me; "Riverside Cancels Street Hockey League". Of course, with our Lodge interests in Riverside and being involved in street hockey in my youth, I read on. The League was cancelled due to threats from parents against the league officials and coaches and acts of violence already committed.

What a shame such things happen these days. What a shame that human beings have nothing better to worry about than if their child was penalized in an extracurricular sporting activity; an activity that is supposed to be a fun and educational at the same time. What are the children learning? To yell and commit acts of violence if things don't go their way?

After reading the article, I was immediately reminded of the lesson we learn upon entering a Mason's Lodge for the first time. The lesson the Worshipful Master taught our six Entered Apprentices in their recent degrees; the lesson of the Compasses - "To circumscribe our desires and keep our passions within due bounds with all mankind."

These parents definitely have let their passions go beyond those bounds. Would a true Mason have said or done such things? No. A true Mason would be out there helping the children learn the game and sharpen their skills. A true Mason would be a referee making sure the children learn to play fair, with sportsmanship and within the rules of the game. A true Mason would watch his children play and marvel at the progress that was being made in this little person's life.

In our Master Mason degree, three individuals lament at the horrible act they have committed. They let their passions exceed those bounds. They cannot take back what they have done. If they had accepted the lessons taught to them using the symbolism of the Compasses, they may have never committed those acts.

The Compasses are not there to stop us from committing horrible acts of passion. They are there to remind us to stop and think before committing such acts. Before anyone commits an act out of passion, they should ask themselves, "How would I feel if such acts were committed against me?"

If those parents had asked this question, their kids would probably still be playing street hockey today.

Bet You Didn't Know

Bet you didn't know:

Since 1980 there have been 12 Masters of Beverly-Riverside Lodge No.107 who are Senior DeMolays from Delaware Valley Chapter. This means that in the past 22 years our Lodge, more then half of the time, we have been lead by men who learned their leadership qualities from the Order of DeMolay. Beverly-Riverside Lodge has had the benefit for gleaning members from Delaware Valley Chapter who we sponsor. There are also countless members of Delaware Valley Chapter who have joined this Lodge and have supported it even by not becoming Master. There are fathers of members of Delaware Valley Chapter who have joined our Lodge because of seeing the support we give to the Chapter and their sons as members.

For those members who do not know much about the Order of DeMolay, I will attempt to give you a thumbnail sketch of the organization. Frank S. Land, a Master Mason in Kansas City, Missouri founded the Order of DeMolay in 1919. "Dad" Land ("Dad" moniker used as a mark of respect, and seemed less formal then "Mr." and yet more formal then "Frank") worked in the Scottish Rite Building in Kansas City where space was provided to the young members to meet. Before long the Order of DeMolay spread nationwide.

The Order of DeMolay is named after Jacques DeMolay, the last Grand Master of the Knights Templar, in France. DeMolay was burned at a stake in 1244 in France, because he denied the Inquisition and refused to disclose the names of his Brethren and the secrets of the Knights Templar. The young men with "Dad" Land thought that the fidelity and toleration that DeMolay expressed was worthy of naming their organization after.

Delaware Valley Chapter was started in 1953, and shortly after that, one of our lodges' members committed over 30 years of service to the Chapter. "Dad" William E. Gilbert was the "Dad Advisor" of the Chapter for over 25 years. "Dad" Gilbert gave up his chance to be a Past Master of this Lodge in order to commit his life to Delaware Valley Chapter, Order of DeMolay. The Chapter currently meets on the first and third Tuesday at 7:30pm, at the Riverside Lodge Building, and Master Masons are always welcome.

The Order of DeMolay is a leadership organization for young men between 12 and 21 years of age. Many of the same principles of Freemasonry are instilled in these young men. In addition to that, teachings of responsibility, term planning, fund raising, communication are some of the basics of the Order of DeMolay.

If you have any questions about the Order of DeMolay, feel free to seek out the Senior Warden, Bro. Ronald Stubbs, the Junior Warden, Bro. William Ewan, the Treasurer, W.B. Allen Naese, the Senior Master of Ceremonies, Bro. Edward Marren, or myself, W.B. Ray Flynn.
