

## Masonic Light

A funny thing happened to me the other day. I was in a local wholesale warehouse, you know, the kind with shelving rising up to the forty-foot ceiling. The ones were when you buy toilet paper; you have to buy 800 rolls at once. I can never seem to get out of these places without spending at least a hundred dollars.

Anyway, I had my daughters with me to pick up a few needed items. Even though my basket was only a quarter full, I knew somehow that the final amount would come to the magic number of one hundred dollars. It was inevitable! This led me to thoughts that plague many middle-aged married (and unmarried!) fathers; how the mortgage and car payments would be made in the coming weeks. I barely had enough cash in my wallet to get the slushie that my daughters would demand of me upon our exiting the store. You fathers know what I am talking about.

I was stirred out of my foggy thoughts by a discussion at the register in front of me. A young couple was attempting to purchase a new television. It was the only item in their cart; a feat that still manages to amaze me as I can never get out of there with only one item. They seemed to be discussing the final price of the TV with the cashier. As I eavesdropped, I came to understand that they had not accounted for tax on the item. The final price of the TV and tax was \$139.91. They had handed the cashier a handful of cash that apparently added up to \$139 even. I watched as the young man grasped at his pockets and pulled a few pennies from his jacket. His lady (I am not sure of the relationship, but I assumed they were newly married or engaged) shook her head indicating that she had no change.

The cashier was new and being attended by a manger. The manager spoke to the customers asking if they had the proper amount. They indicated that they were short by mere pennies. The manager told the cashier to void the sale and give the couple their money back. I watched as disappointment came across the couple's faces. I didn't hesitate...I asked the manager how much they were short. She said 91¢. I reached for my wallet and took one of my three remaining dollars and handed it to the cashier.

You would have thought I purchased the entire TV for the young couple. The manager said I was an angel. The young male customer couldn't thank me enough. This simple act of charity changed the day of the cashier and manager, and changed the lives of the young couple.

For me it was a no-brainer. It was something I would have done any time, any place. It is something I learned to do as a Mason. If they needed five dollars, I would have gone over to the MAC machine and gotten it for them. It was the right thing to do and as a Mason, it came naturally. I had time to think of this after it occurred. I felt good, the young couple felt good and the cashiers felt good. What a great thing!

As Masons, we don't always have a chance to behold first hand the work of our charity. Our Grand Lodge assessment and appeal donations go to help the Masonic Home, but when we go there, we don't see it as our charity at work. We see the good of the Shrine Hospitals and the Masonic Learning Centers, but again we don't feel the charity first hand.

First hand charity is simple and starts with you. If you see a person struggling to carry something, don't look away, go over and help. If you see someone is a dollar short, give them the dollar. If someone looks like they need help, go help them.

In this day and age, with the daily dose of horror stories given to us by the news media, it is easy to fall out of being charitable for fear of being abused or even physically harmed. Don't let this stop you from being a good charitable person. Charity doesn't always mean doling out money. It can mean helping your fellow man in little ways by performing small acts. These little acts can and will make the world a better place.


## Secretary's Corner....
