Funny little story that if, given some thought, contains an important message that can pertain to the Fraternity of Freemasonry.

How many of us are merely tapping the wheels of Freemasonry? How many of us have looked past the “fraternal” aspects of the organization.

I recently had the pleasure of attending a table lodge at Pyramid Lodge No. 92 in New Egypt. As usual, the fare was top notch as was the company. WB James Hanebury gave an inspiring talk about his personal journey into the Fraternity. I sat with about 65 brothers who really enjoyed each others company.

I am sure that everyone who sat in that Lodge Hall that evening enjoys the fraternal aspects of Freemasonry. You could sit and talk to just about any brother in that room and know that you had something in common. You could talk to him as if you had known him for a long time. The Fraternal aspect of Masonry is what attracts many to tender an application to a Lodge.

How many, though, have looked beyond that “fraternal” aspect and look at the teachings of the Craft. Most active Masons can expound upon the great teachings of our Fraternity. Most Masons can listen to or participate in one of our degrees and know a little bit of the meaning of its symbolism. How many of us have looked further?

Freemasonry is two things. It is a community and it is an educational system. The fraternal aspects of Freemasonry represent the community. Many chose to become part of the community. They immerse themselves into the community (Lodge) becoming integral parts of the “neighborhood”. Some members come and some go. Some stick around for a lifetime, some a few years, and some a few days. Some are faithful to their community yet always talk about how good “other communities” have it. Some decide that they don’t like their community and move to another.

Unfortunately, many of these community members feel that what they are part of is all of Freemasonry. Yet, they have not even touched the educational system. The real secrets of Freemasonry are in hidden in the allegories and symbols of the Craft. We all know what the square and compasses teaches us, but does anyone know what the beehive, anchor and ark represent and teach us?

Here is an example. Did you know that Solomon's Temple is a representation of our own living temple? No structure ever equaled the temple Solomon built to God. Neither can our own body ever be equaled. Also that your living temple is representative of the three degrees of Masonry? Your feet represent the Entered Apprentice, or bearers of burden. Your hands, the Fellowcraft, workers of stone and builders of wonder. And your mind, the Master Mason, or director of the Fellowcraft and Apprentices.

Freemasonry is overflowing with these symbols and allegories. It seems a shame that we are not directed toward the educational system of Freemasonry. When we join Lodge, we are readily welcomed into the community yet we are rarely introduced into that other part of our order. We may say things like “We have library, if you would like to learn a little more about Freemasonry.” A little more??? There is so much more as to spin the collective heads of every Grand Line officer that New Jersey has ever seen!

New members should not only be shown the library, they should be encouraged to read some of the books. Certain titles should become “mandatory” reading. An educational night should be “mandatory” for each lodge. Worshipful Masters should take very seriously, their pledge to spread Masonic Light. Mentors should be instructed to not only touch on the real meaning of Freemasonry, but to encourage the new member to seek out his own path to the hidden treasures.

Our Fraternity was not created over night. Hundreds of years have gone into perfecting the educational system. Allegories and symbols were created by some of the greatest minds ever to walk the Earth.

We owe it to ourselves as upright men and Masons to look further beyond the community aspects of our Fraternity. Meeting for a dinner once a month with the brethren is not “making a good man better”. Our teachings can and will make you a better man.

Are you just tapping the wheels of Freemasonry?
