“coming in the same way and manner...”

As Freemasons we all recall knocking at the door of the Lodge seeking admission into its sacred halls to discover its mysteries. It was said that we were “coming in the same way and manner as all others who have gone this way before.”

As I now sit in the East, or on the sidelines visiting other lodges, and at District Lodges of Instruction I have often thought, “How is it that I have gotten to the place where I now find myself?” It occurred to me that the answer is by “coming in the same way and manner as all others who have gone this way before”.

That “way and manner” began with my studying the first cipher book. While the language being used was at first a formidable challenge, I would soon master this task and subsequently prove myself proficient before the Lodge. This same scenario repeated itself following the next two degrees and I found myself a Master Mason. Prior to being raised, I agreed to sit in the Junior Master of Ceremonies Chair. While it first seemed that I had been railroaded into accepting this chair assignment, the acceptance was ultimately up to me, and it too, was an act of my own free will and accord.

As I reflect back on those things that have helped to prepare me for the Oriental Chair, I realize that the answer is “coming in the same way and manner as all others who have gone this way before”. This “way and manner” was besides spending many, many hours with the ritual book, was my diligent attendance at Lodge rehearsals and District Lodges of Instruction. It was there that I was schooled in the performance of the Craft. Studying the ritual book only taught me the verbiage. It was through this “hands-on instruction” that I learned the floor work and proper ways of doing things, which seem to be ever changing. This instruction I am sure has helped me to hone my ritual skills, which hopefully have helped in making a more favorable impression on the minds of incoming brethren. More importantly to my spiritual being, it has helped me to understand “why we do some of the things we do, and why we do them the way that we do”.

So, when you find that through “an act of your own free will and accord” you have decided to accept a “chair” in the Lodge, especially if you have aspirations of continuing on the journey to the East, commit yourself to more than just learning the words. Make the commitment to the whole experience. Just as when the Senior Deacon was about to place you in the Junior Warden’s chair, you were asked to prove yourself a Master Mason, give us an example of your fortitude and fidelity, and prove yourself; prove that you deserve to occupy “that chair”.

YOU GOTTA BE KIDDING!!! - Part II

Why is lodge attendance important?

The real answer is that regardless of how many Masons attend, they are the ones who will carry on the work of Freemasonry. They are the ones who are involved in charitable activities; they are the ones involved in calling on sick and distressed Brothers; they are the ones involved in lodge sponsored community activities and other lodge programs. So, the more members attending lodge, the more work we will be able to accomplish. I realize there are some Masons particularly accountants, attorneys, and other professionals who make significant contributions to the Craft, even though they rarely, if ever, come to lodge. But the results of the work they do is brought back into the lodge. So, no matter how we judge what is done, it comes back to the lodge as the central point from which our work is carried out. Let me say again, the lodge is the center of our Masonic universe.

What is being done today to stimulate lodge attendance?

Sadly, not very much. Faced with declining membership, most Grand Lodges are pouring their energies into new members. If you track membership decline, you will find that demits and NPD's about equal deaths. We can do nothing about death, but thousands of Masons leave the Fraternity each year either by simply refusing to pay their dues or by requesting a demit.

The price of this neglect is that no matter how many new members we bring in, they simply do not equal the numbers leaving. In fact the concept of one-day classes, however successful, may simply be building next generation's NPD's and demits if we do not find ways to keep these new members interested and active.

How we bring members into the Fraternity is far less important than what we do with them afterwards. Even so, our emphasis has been on finding ways encourage new members and ignoring the ones we already have! Is there anything we can really do?

Simply increasing membership is not enough. We have to interest the new Mason so that he will want to continue Masonic activity after taking the degrees. The only way we can do that is to make ourselves better informed about what our Fraternity is all about and what Masons are trying to accomplish. This is not an easy commitment. It requires time, time, time, and in an era where no one believes he has any time to spare, the vital contribution Freemasons make has got to be stressed.

That's a start. The real answer is even more basic. The teachings of Freemasonry and its ability to be a significant force for good in the community and nation have to be communicated to our new, but just as importantly, to our existing members. Do not leave this particular meeting or any Masonic meeting you ever attend without taking what you have learned with you and sharing it with others.

Our problem is we don't know how to do it. That's why we are apprehensive about even trying. We have been slow to recognize that our Fraternity has changed dramatically in its make up. We now have many members with few if any leadership skills. In addition we have members who simply know nothing about the Fraternity.

There is also the equally devastating problem of trying to encourage men to join a Fraternity perceived as "main stream," with a strong emphasis on values. Fraught with cynicism, distrust, lack of respect for others, and far too often very little self-respect our 1960's, 70's, and 80's generations showed little interest in ethical or moral values or in organizations that stressed these values.

To suggest that there are overnight cures is simply misunderstanding the 40 to 50 years of benign neglect our Fraternity has experienced!

Quite honestly, Freemasons will have to accept a fundamental tenet of our Fraternity. Being a Mason requires commitment! A commitment of time and effort.

For heaven's sake, let's stop telling men how easy it is to join and how they don't have to learn or memorize anything - just show up! That is not what being a Mason is all about. It requires an effort to learn and then to share what we have learned with others. We have to teach Masons to be Masons and not just members.

Freemasons helped build democracy in both the United States and Canada. We can now play a vital role in rebuilding our nations from the valueless societies we are becoming into strong, just and caring countries.

Ethics and morality are not just Masonic values; they are community values. Expressing these values by living them, each Freemason can, by example, raise his nation's standards of conduct and behavior!

It won't happen over night, but it will happen if enough Freemasons make that commitment. It would also produce the kind of Masons who would enjoy going to Lodge.

Wouldn't it be great to hear those welcome words? You gotta be kidding! I can't go to the game, it's my lodge night!
