LEO Corner

Most of us recognize the formation of Masonry in London England, in 1717 when four lodges met to establish the Grand Lodge of England. One obvious aspect of this fact often over looked is that these lodges already had over 100 members practicing in masonry, so when did it really begin? Is there any further documentation to the true beginnings, and not just the modern organization of the fraternity? Here are a few historically relative findings:

1646 - The first known use of 'freemason' is found in the diary of Elias Ashmole. He states, "I was made a freemason at Warrington", and may very well be the first documented speculative mason, because he was not a craftsman of the Masons Company of London.

1598- William Schaw issued the Schaw Statues, which were an attempt to structure freemasonry by requiring written records of meetings, and dates and duties of members.

1450 – A document containing the constitution of German stonemasons makes references to the several sciences now contained in the fellow craft lessons. This document was first transcribed by Mathew Cooke and issued in 1861.

1390- The Reguis Poem – 794 lines of English verse that were first published by James Halliwell in 1840. This document contains regulations for the craft, and recounts the introduction of masonry in 924 AD by King Athelstan

926AD- According to the Halliwell Manuscript, king Athelstan's brother prince Edwin presided over the first Grand Lodge in the city of York where the constitutions of English Freemasonry were established from existing old Greek and Latin documents.

Although researchers and historians may never agree on the beginning of freemasonry and its evolution to speculative masonry the fact is we have documented lineage dating back hundreds of years, with specific terms and traditions we continue through today.
