The Rejected Stone



THE Rev. C. H. Spurgeon, of London, thus appropriates a well-known Masonic tradition:

I have heard a story — I can not tell whether it is true or not — out of some of the Jewish legends: it is a tale concerning the text: "The stone which the builders refused, the same is become the headstone of the corner." It is said that when Solomon's temple was building, all the stones were brought from the quarry, ready cut and fashioned, and there were marked on all the blocks the places where they were to be put. Amongst the stones was a very curious one; it seemed of no describable shape, it appeared unfit for any portion of the building. They tried it at this wall, but it would not fit; they tried it at another, but it could not be accommodated; so, vexed and angry, they threw it away. The temple was so many years building that this stone became covered with moss, and grass grew around it. Every body passing by laughed at

the stone; they said Solomon was wise, and doubtless all the other stones were right, but as for that block, they might as well send it back to the quarry, for it was quite sure it was meant for nothing. Year after year rolled on, and the poor stone was still despised; the builders constantly refused it. The eventful day came when the temple was to be finished and opened, and the multitude was assembled to see the grand sight. The builders said, "Where is the top-stone? Where is the pinnacle?" They little thought where the crowning marble was, until some said, "Perhaps that stone which the builders refused is meant to be the top-stone." They then took it, and hoisted to the top of the house; and as it reached the summit they found it well adapted to the place. Loud *hosannas* made the welkin ring, as the stone which the builders refused thus became the head-stone of the corner. So it is with Jesus Christ. The builders cast him away. He was a plebeian; he was a man of poor extrac-

tion; he was a man acquainted with sinners, who walked in poverty and meanness; hence the worldly-wise despised him. But when God shall gather together, in one, all things that are in heaven and that are in earth, then Christ shall be the glorious consummation of all things.

"Christ reigns in heaven the top-most stone, And well deserves the praise."

He shall be exalted; He shall be honored, His name shall endure as long as the sun, and all nations shall be blessed in Him, yea, all generations shall call him blessed. ∞


Scriptures for a Studying Mason

Looking for a Book?

One of the hardest things about Masonic research is finding the book you need. I often purchase as many as ten books for each subject I study and paper I attempt to write. This be-

comes expensive and leaves me with stacks of books all over the house (stacks that Mamie hates). Unfortunately, this is often the only solution if you live a great distance from the closest Masonic library. So, where do you find great prices on Masonic books? I have three basic sources I always check for that one book that I must have in hard copy format:



ABE - A, B, E are the initials for the online network of booksellers called *Advanced Book*

Exchange. I almost hesitate to mention the site. I don't want you to buy that one book I need before I get to, but alas, the things we do in the name of fraternity! The site is a collection of hundreds of used booksellers who list their books including the condition, basic information, price, and shipping cost. The site has an advanced search that allows you to search the collections by author, title, publisher, ISBN, price range, keywords, first editions, binding, and more. The site also has a bookseller rating much like e-bay to allow you to judge the credibility of the seller. It was from here that I located a third edition *The Tennessee Masonic Textbook*, the precursor of the current *Tennessee Craftsman*. The site web-address is www.abebooks.com.

Amazon.com - Have you heard of Kessinger Publishing. Kessinger specializes in reprinting and preserving rare and hard-to-find books. They are located near Glacier National Park in Montana, and they have digitally preserved thousands of Masonic related titles. Kessinger Publishing is a "print-on-demand" publisher. Their primary vendor is Amazon.com. You can search their titles through www.kessinger.net; however, I have found it simpler to begin and end searches through the Amazon.com site. The books are facsimile copies of their original texts. Some works have been re-typeset for ease in reading. They are, usually, softbound and hold together well. The best part is that they are cheap! *Ordo ab Chao*, which contains early versions of the Scottish Rite rituals, a 448 page book sells for \$26.97! I have one word of caution, some books are only portions of larger works. For example, *The Bristol Masonic Ritual: The First Degree or Entered Apprentice* is \$12.92 and the first section of *Bristol Masonic Ritual: The Oldest and Most Unique Craft Ritual Used in England.* The latter book is only \$16.76. Why buy 1/3 of the book for nearly the same price the entire book costs?

E-bay - I confess, I am an e-bay junkie. There needs to be a twelve-step program for this. You never know what you will find on e-bay. E-bay is the third place I look for a particular book. Why is it the third place? Well before I begin a bidding competetion with some brother in cyberspace, I want to be sure I know what a good price on the book is. The easiest and best way to find that out is to look at Amazon and ABE. There is no reason to bid \$50.00 on *Morals and Dogma* when I can purchase a used Kessinger copy for \$5.98 or a hardbound 1966 edition in great condition for 20 bucks on ABE or Amazon. Also, be careful about the Masonic books on CD. Some of these are good, and some are a waste of your money, because you can get them for free elsewhere on the net.

This brings the discussion to electronic versions of books. Although I am still one who prefers to read a book holding it in my hand, there are definite advantages to having an electronic version of a book. The best advantage is that many electronic versions are searchable. This comes in very handy when you are looking for a section of a work that deals with a particular subject.

Sacred-Text.com - This site has hundreds of rare and esoteric works preserved in searchable text format. They have ten complete works directly related to Freemasonry including *Morals and Dogma, Duncan's Ritual,* and *The Symbolism of Freemasonry*. The site is FREE.

Pietre-Stones Review of Freemasonry - This site was started on July 17, 1996. It serves as a clearing-house for hundreds of Masonic works. Masonic authors such as Mark Tabbert, S.

Brent Morris, Andrew Prescott, Alain Bernheim, and Leon Zeldis all have paper posted on this site. There are many Masonic books available in searchable format as well. The web-address is: www.freemasons-freemasonry.com/masonic_books_online.html. Its also FREE.

Google Book Search - Google Book is an amazing site. There are thousands of books on all kinds of subjects. Some of the books provide a limited number of pages for view but many of them offer full access and even pdf download. When looking at the books on Google Book, they are completely searchable even if their pdfs are not! There are tons of Masonic

books available in searchable format and pdf download. Titles include *Light on Masonry, The Principles of Masonic Law, A Lexicon of Freemasonry,* and many rituals and exposés. There are also complete volumes of *The Mystic Star* and *Ars Quatour Coroatorum* (both Masonic periodicals). To access Google Book, go to the normal Google site, click on the *more* arrow, and click on books in the scroll down menu. All you have to do is sign up for a free account and you can create your own library to store your favorite available books.

With these six simple sources, there are few books needed by that an armchair Masonic researcher cannot obtain. It will also allow you to increase your sources without adding a new stack of books for your wife to fuss about. Check these site, and I promise you will find a book that you cannot live without. ∞
