GRAND TALL'S MESSAGE

Brethren:

My term as your Grand Tall will expire with the installation of my successor in office, on December 23rd. In my last message to you as your G.T., I would like to reiterate a part of my Installation Address, for the same holds good now as at time of delivery.

"I wish to express my deep and heartfelt appreciation for the honor you have conferred, the highest within your power, and the confidence reposed. What is past is Prologue. If we as Masons and Tall Cedars, cannot work together harmoniously, there is little hope for a peaceful world, free from war and strife. To those who have labored so loyally and assiduously for our Forest, giving freely of their time, effort and earthly store, I express my deep appreciation. To those who have been lackadaisical, who have failed to attend the meetings and support the activities of the Forest, or have failed to discharge duties assigned, or who have hindered, rather than helped, the forward progress of our Forest, I make an urgent appeal that they endeavor to support their new Grand Tall and their Forest, during the ensuing year and the years which may be spared them in this earthly Forest. As I have often said Cedarism in general, and Montgomery Forest in particular, will only be what you as individual members ordain it to be.

Remember brethren if you support your Grand Tall, it is not for his sake, but for the good of your Forest and Cedarism; likewise, if you fail to support your officers and work harmoniously for, and with them, you are only hindering the forward progress of Cedarism in general, and your Forest in particular. There should be no drones in the Hive of Cedarism. Make a New Year's resolution to support George and the other officers, to work for your Forest, and help make this the biggest and best in our Forest's history.

It has been your G.T.'s honest endeavor to raise the standard of Cedarism, and to engender the true spirit of Cedarism within the heart of each member; not for self glorification but for the good of Our Order and Our Forest. FIRST JOINT DISTRICT DIVINE SERVICE

We went unto the House of God, and there learned more about the "Secrets of the Forest."

The members of District 20, met at the Masonic Temple in Hyattsville, Maryland, at 7 p.m., on Sunday, November 12th, and assembled in parade formation as follows: Band of Capitol Forest 104; Ladies Auxiliary of 104 and wives and lady friends of Cedars; Job's Daughters and DeMolays; Montgomery Forest 134; Temple Forest 136; Prince Georges Forest 139, and Grand Tall and members of Annapolis Forest 126. The Color Guards and Rangers were in uniform, while the officers wore Tuxedos.

The hearts of those in line of march could not help but have been warmed as they marched through the streets of the town, and up the Baltimore Boulevard, Highway No. 1, to the Methodist Church, to the strains of "Onward Christian Soldiers." The police were on hand with red flares halting all traffic, in order that we might proceed uninterruptedly. Every Cedar in line felt that he was truly a part of something which was going places and doing things—for Cedarism was on the March.

The Church was filled almost to capacity, which number included approximately forty from Montgomery Forest, of which fact we are justly proud. Senior Deputy Supreme Tall Cedar John McFaul: Tall Cedar Past Supreme Thomas C. Havell; District Representatives William D. Senger and James G. Reese, of Districts 14 and 20, respectively; Grand Tall Cedars Lancelot Bartley, No. 104, Wm. Homer Carroll, No. 134, Wirt Balderson, No. 136, Newman Smoot Lee, No. 139; and Chaplains Reno, No. 104, Pixley, No. 134 and Beckett, No. 139, were escorted to the rostrum.

After the opening of the service, and rendition of a selection by the fine vested choir, Chaplain Reno read as the Scripture Lesson 1st Kings V; following this we all joined heartily in singing three

old hymns, "God of our Fathers," "Faith of our Fathers," and "What a Friend we have in Jesus." This was followed by short talks by Brothers McFaul, Havell, Reese, Senger, Carroll and Lee. All emphasized the need for the practice of the true principles of brotherhood, and drew attention to the strong link between the Holy Word and Cedarism.

At this point Chaplain Beckett, Pastor of the First Methodist Church, delivered a most interesting and imspiring sermon on the Secrets of the Forest. Drew attention to the fact that the first secret was the banding together, as Hewers, to build something that was to last, a Temple of God; secondly, to practice the truest teaching of brotherhood as set forth by the Master, and thirdly, through service and faith to have a greater reliance upon Diety, and a closer and most harmonious fellowship with God.

The hearts of those present were strangely warmed, and all left God's House quietly and with a better understanding of what Cedarism stood for. One Cedar remarked "God does move in a mysterious way his wonders to perform," while another remarked, he felt like singing that old hymn "Speak softly the Savoir is here." The thought was gleaned by many, that in these turbulent, chaotic, and uncertain times, more than ever, there was need for a closer walk with God, and the need for Brother to clasp the hand of Brother and march fearlessly through the Night of Doubt and Sorrow, to the light of a new and better day.

This was the first Joint District Divine Service. The idea originated with Grand Tall Newman Smoot Lee of Prince Georges Forest No. 139, and was encouraged and most heartily concurred in by our District Representative Jimmy Reese. It is contemplated that these joint services will be held periodically, and it is hoped other districts will emulate this activity. Unamimity of purpose and real team work and cooperation, is becoming the "Order of the Day" in District 20.
