

Albert Pelley wants to see you about the Thing. Cail him,



Brother Paul V. Thompson, one of the nost faithful Brothers in the Tall Cedars, and Tyler of Silver Spring Lodge No. 215, has retired after 44 years of service with Uncle San. Paul started his Government career as apprentice machinist at the Washington Navy Yard. He came through during World War I, of course in the Navy, as Chief Engineer of his ship. He was a Lieutenant Commander in the Reserves.



In January 1923, he returned to Government service as supervising foreman of the typewriter repair department in Agriculture. He later transferred to the National Parks Service in the Department of the Interior.

His next transfer was in 1937 to the Federal Works Authority in the Public Buildings Service, and again in 1948 to the Federal Supply Service of the General Services Administration, where he was located until he retired.

Paul treasures a Scroll given to him in honor of those 144 years of service. He has said that he is getting a substantial retirement pension, but he is entirely too young to be hung up on a shelf. He has investigated several opportunities for a job and expects to go back to work on a new job within a very short time. His retirement was effective April 30.
