

Tom Savini was at home when it happened. It was only 8:45 am, and the Library where he worked didn't open until noon on Tuesdays. Tom, the Library Director for the <u>Livingston Masonic Library</u> in New York City, had plenty of time to watch a little TV before heading out to work.

Unexpectedly, the voices on the television grew confused and frantic. As he watched, Tom watched reports of the unthinkable: a jet had crashed into the North Tower of the World Trade Center. No one knew what to think that early on. Was it a terrible accident? Why was a jet that size flying so low over New York City? Could that have been done intentionally? Everyone's questions were answered when, eighteen minutes later, another jet flew into the World Trade Center, this time hitting the South Tower. America was under attack, and New York City was Ground Zero for the assault.

Tom called the <u>Grand Lodge Masonic Hall</u>, where the library was located, and spoke to the Grand Secretary, Right Worshipful Gary Henningsen. The Masonic Hall is a nineteen story building just a little over a mile from where the World Trade Center was located, and a few of the masons, including R.W. Henningsen and other Officers of the Grand Line, had gone up to the roof for a clearer view of what was happening. The calls went back and forth between Tom and the brethren at Masonic Hall as the events of that day unfolded.

A few days before the tragedy of 9/11, the Masonic Hall had opened an exhibit in conjunction with the <u>Fraunces Tavern</u> <u>Museum of Colonial and Revolutionary</u> <u>Freemasonry</u>. They had borrowed the George Washington Bible from St. Johns Lodge #1 and put it on display at the Fraunces Tavern Museum, which was only about four blocks away from Ground Zero. No one knew if more attacks were imminent, and so R.W. Henningsen asked Tom to retrieve the Bible and bring it to Masonic Hall for safekeeping.

On Thursday, September 13<sup>th</sup> Tom met up with the <u>New York Port Authority Police</u>. R.W. Henningsen had arranged for them to bring Tom to the Fraunces Tavern Museum, which was still closed. Their route took them along Canal Street, which runs through the heart of Chinatown. Shops were closed, there was no traffic, and there were almost no people to be seen. This was usually one of the busiest parts of the entire city, but that day it seemed like it was abandoned.

Tom said that he couldn't see much from the street that close to the epicenter. There were sirens up ahead, and some lingering smoke and ash, but the most disconcerting thing was the stillness. It was as if the City had come to a halt that close to Ground Zero. Tom is just one of the many Masons whose lives were touched by the events of that day. We as a nation, Mason and non-Mason alike, we were all affected. In New York, the Grand Lodge was directly involved with the cleanup and recovery efforts:

- The Senior Grand Warden was involved with the Red Cross, who were working to assist emergency personnel and any survivors.
- The Grand Marshall was a police Lieutenant with the recovery team.
- The Grand Lodge of New York made sizable contributions to the cleanup effort, as well as to a school located just next door to the World Trade Center.
- Masons lost their lives, their loved ones, their friends, and their neighbors in the attack and in the cleanup.
