He is sadly missed by his family members and many friend s. No Masonic Services

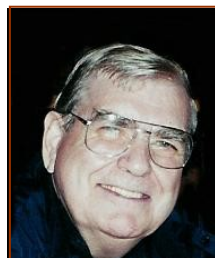

They buy electronic gadgets that cost hundreds of dollars for kids who think they are *entitled* to the

latest toys without earning any of them. And many of them are broken before the first bill arrives. But when a new version hits the market two months later they have to have that one too. They buy coffee makers and toasters for their friends that already have two of them. They buy clothes for friends that are the wrong size, the wrong color, or something that the friend just plain doesn't like. In the meantime the friend is going deep into debt to do the same thing for them. Now how much sense does that make?

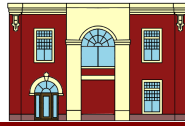
The holidays are over now, and maybe life will return to normal again. Of course normal for many of those people means maxed out credit cards, overdrawn checking accounts, and trying to figure out how in the world they are going to pay for everything. They have spent money they didn't have, and now have to pay twenty-four percent interest on those credit cards. Many of them will not be paid off before the same cycle starts again next year. Of course the credit card companies love this. Fortunately I'm not one of those people.

Sure, my wife and I spend money for our children, grandchildren, and great-grandchildren. But we don't do *any shopping*. We learned a long time ago that we could keep our sanity if we stayed away from the stores in November and December. We simply write a small check to each of them, put it in a Christmas card, and hand it to them the first part of December so they can buy what they want. Our shopping is done in the time it takes to write the checks. Now I can stretch out in my Lazy Boy with a cup of coffee or hot chocolate and enjoy Christmas programs on TV. We don't have to worry about bills coming in all year long. We've already paid for everything. Now we can enjoy Christmas.

I watched a news reporter on TV interview a mother shopping at Walmart. She was buying a four hundred dollar cell phone, a three hundred dollar iPod, and a six hundred dollar laptop computer for her ten year old daughter. *A ten year old?* I couldn't believe it. That child will never learn responsibility. She will never learn to fend for herself. She will always think she is entitled. I couldn't stand it. I changed channels.

What do you think was on the other channel? You guessed it. A camera showed a long line of people waiting to buy a new version of a cell phone. The line was *outside* the store, and about two blocks long. It was the 11:00 p.m. news, and the people were waiting for the store to





open at *midnight*. One hundred of the new state-of-the-art cell phones were waiting for the first one hundred customers to fight their way in to buy them. There looked to be about two hundred people in the line. And it was *cold* outside. Can you imagine? People waiting for three or four hours in cold weather at night to pay six hundred dollars for a cell phone that takes pictures, connects to the internet, does facebook and myspace, and twittered all over the world. Maybe it also does laundry and washes the dishes. My cell phone only sends and receives phone calls, and it only cost twenty dollars. I don't send text messages and I don't need anything else.

But the thing that bothers me most is how Christmas has changed from being Jesus' birthday to being Santa Claus day. The holiday is *CHRISTmas*, not *SANTAmas*. We're giving presents to people on the wrong day. The custom is to give presents to someone on their birthday. If your birthday is March 13 or August 22 why do you expect a present on December 25? That isn't your birthday. So if your birthday is not on December 25 why do we give you presents? Why do we give gifts to everyone except Jesus on December 25?

Now I know you can't physically hand a present to Jesus on his birthday, but couldn't you give a useful present to some needy person on Jesus' birthday? I think Jesus would like that. And I don't think a needy person would want a cell phone or a computer, when they need food and clothing.

Thanksgiving, Christmas, New Years, Valentines Day, Halloween — holidays have become far too commercial. The big box stores have brainwashed people to think they must live in the lap of luxury. Newspapers have more ads than news. Television commercials use up more time than the programs they sponsor. Buy, buy, buy, spend, spend, spend. Live on other peoples' money. Have the latest and most expensive things so you can keep up with the Joneses.

But I think I've got it all figured out. Let's change our holiday system. Let's have one holiday each month. Let's call it Family Day. Let's get the family together, relax, talk, eat together, and enjoy each other. Let's not give *anybody* presents on this day. Let's celebrate *not* spending money. We won't have to worry about sizes, colors, inferior merchandise, guarantees, and best of all — no bills coming later for holiday spending. And if we want something we can afford to pay cash for we can buy it ourselves. Let

the kids flip hamburgers to earn money to buy their high powered toys. Maybe they will learn something we refuse to teach them.

And built a bridge to span the tide.

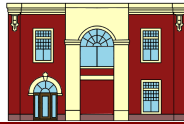
"Old man," said a fellow pilgrim, near,

A youth, whose feet must pass this way.

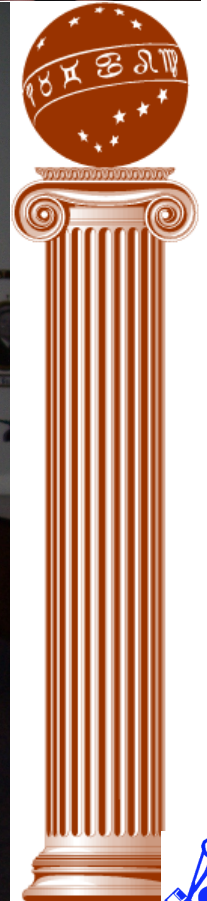
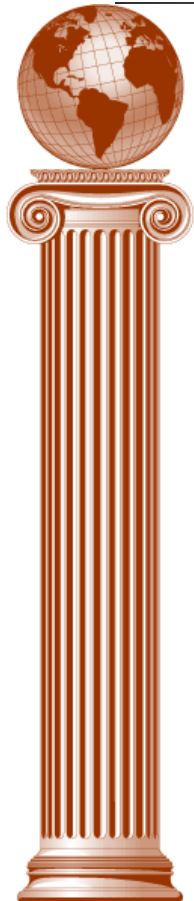
"This chasm, that has been naught to me,

Good friend, I am building the bridge for him."

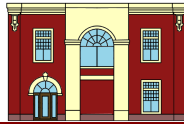

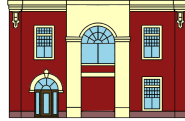

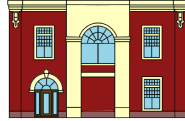
HOW DOES ONE JOIN EASTERN STAR?
