Butter Fingers

- 1 cup chopped pecans
- 2 1/2 cups flour
- 3/4 cup sugar
- 2 sticks butter
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 1 16oz box powdered sugar

Preheat oven to 325 degrees. Combine all ingredients except for powered sugar. Roll into small "fingers" or balls. Bake for 20 to 30 minutes. Roll immediately in powered sugar.
