Are The Small Town Lodges In Trouble?

I was talking to my friend, Brother Joe Noblin, the other day. Joe is the Secretary at Hubert Lodge #67 A.F. & A. M. over in Chappell Hill. We both have many worries concerning the survival of small town Lodges.

Are the small town Lodges of Texas in trouble? YES, many things including increasing prices, the shrinking number of new petitions, lack of participation from members and shrinking income are all taking their toll on small town Lodges.

Brother Joe mentioned that Hubert Lodge has been on a downhill financial slide for the last five or six years and is in worse shape now then in memory. Hubert Lodge has about 33 members and like Hempstead Lodge their income is also greatly reduced due to endowments and 50 year members. Hempstead Lodge had 54 members as of June 24 and only 22, or 40% of those paid dues for 2004.

Joe mentioned that Hubert Lodge suffered from was some very expensive projects over in last 5 or 6 years. The Travis Monument, a new roof, a new air conditioning system (never finished), revising the electrical system and re-keying locks in the Lodge hit them very hard. Joe stated these projects have cost Hubert Lodge between \$60,000 and \$70,000 during that few year period.

If Hempstead Lodge doesn't want to follow in Hubert's footsteps we have to find ways to encourage younger, good men to discover Masonry and encourage existing member participation. We also need to be very careful in choosing our future Lodge leaders. We must make sure that they will be diligent and not allow things like building maintenance and Masonic sponsored projects to over extend our resources as happened at Hubert Lodge during the last few years.

Waller Lodge Installation

The Waller Lodge #808 Installation ceremonies were held Saturday evening June 28, 2004. Three Hempstead officers elect were installed as officers in Waller Lodge.

Freemasonry is a Fraternity

Freemasonry is the oldest, and by far, the largest fraternal order in the world. Its Lodges stretch around the globe and like the British Empire, it might well be said that the sun never sets upon the Masonic Lodge. Fraternity an association of brothers, and that is exactly what Freemasonry is: a society of friends and brothers. It is not a benefit society in the sense that one becomes a member of it because of the insurance benefits he may receive or which may insure to his family at his death. It is not an eleemosynary institution, founded to collect and disburse charity, or based on the giving of alms.

It is not a secret society in that its Temples are openly marked and almost everyone in the community knows where they are located. The Grand Lodge publishes a list of the members of every Lodge. Many of the Lodges have individual bulletins, which carry the names of officers and members as well. Thus it is, in the strictest sense of the word, a society with secrets, which are limited to its obligation: its modes of recognitions, such as pass-words and grips, etc; and certain parts of its ritual.

It is religious in character, but it is not a religion. It is founded upon the basic principle of the Brotherhood of Man under the Fatherhood of God, and everyone who comes into its Lodges must express a belief in God. No one is asked to express a particular belief about God, for this is the privilege of each individual and is not infringed upon by our Fraternity.

Freemasonry practices a selective charity, founded on the principle of brotherly need which is not applicable in all cases that have a surface likeness. No member has a specific claim upon the society for its charity, for this is not a right acquired by becoming a member of the society; rather, it is a privilege.
