PROCLAMATION



We are sure you won't have to look very hard to read the copy this new machine makes. We also feel that the investment you have made in this will pay off. Here are the actual figures so that you may know what this will mean to the Forest.

The three (3) inserts in this bulletin, classed as 12 pages, would cost \$5,00 per page or \$60,00 if printed. To give it to you in this form costs \$2.73 for 22 reams of paper about 25¢ worth of ink, and, \$1.02 for 6 stencils which makes A saving of \$56.00. a total of \$4.00 We made a down payment of \$107.00 and are to take four monthly payments of \$53.50 each, As you can see from the above figures, the machine is going to pay for itself in a short time.


