



Laying of Cornerstone of Shawnee Temple, April 17, 1915

a special dispensation was granted to Shawnee Lodge 830 to open the Entered Apprentice Degree and appear in public for the purpose of laying the cornerstone of Shawnee Temple on Saturday. April 17 1915.

The lodge was called for 2;30 pm and promptly at 2;55 the march from our old home at 38th and Broadway to the new Temple was begun. The parade was led by Depuety Grand Master, TJ Adams, who was acting for Grand Master George B Winslow.

Brother. Alfred C Kreiger. the first Master of Shawnee Lodge, had the honor of bearing the trowel; Brother Fronmiller the corn; Brother Victor Dupree the wine.and Brother Gus A. Knapp the relics and tokens that were to be placed in the cornerstone.188 members were in line many having gone to the Temle direct.

BANANA PUDDING

1 box yellow cake mix (& ingredients to make cake) 2 box (small) instant banana pudding... 4 c milk 8 oz whipped topping 20 vanilla wafers, crushed sliced bananas - use your own judgment

Directions

1 Follow the direction on the cake mix box to prepare the actual cake. Prepare it in a 9 x 13" pan. When golden, remove from over and let cool for a few minutes

2 When just slightly cooled, use the end of a wooden spoon (the handle end) to poke holes into the baked cake. Don't be shy; make the holes big enough for the pudding to seep into and go deep enough with the spoon that you hit the bottom of the pan.

3 Next, prepare your pudding mixture. Combine your 4 cups of milk and the instant pudding mix; whisk until fully combined and there are no lumps.

4 Now it's time to fill those holes! Pour the pudding mixture over the entire cake, taking care to get it into all your holes. Use the spoon to help really get it into the cake and spread evenly.


5 Refrigerate for about two hours... or until set. Top with whipped topping, crushed vanilla wafers and sliced banana! Serve and enjoy. (Refrigerate any leftovers.)

Andrew Jackson's Early Life

Andrew Jackson was born on March 15, 1767, in the Waxhaws region on the border of North Carolina. The son of Irish immigrants Jackson started life becoming a lawyer and later married his wife Rachel. Andrew Jackson, who served as a major general in the War of 1812, commanded U.S. forces in a five-month campaign against the Creek Indians, allies of the British. After that campaign ended in a decisive American victory in the Battle of Tohopeka Jackson was the nation's first frontier president, and his election marked a turning point in American politics, as the center of political power shifted from East to West. He earned the name Old Hickory after leaving office Jackson retired to the Hermitage where he lived til his death on June 1845
