ards of Freemasonry for future generations. It is an important statement, but one that can easily be misconstrued. Some will take it to mean that we are to preserve the craft as it is now or as it were in the years before. There are those that want to center solely on the past, and ignore the future. They focus on where we have been rather than were we are going. Now, before I go too far down this path, let it be certain that I am in no way implying the past should be forgotten or cast aside. Nothing could be further from the truth, for our history defines us! Yet, it is merely one side of the equation; only a part of the sum. Our future and present are as important as our past much in the same way that current and new brothers are as necessary as those that came before them.

Our craft is based on certain landmarks that are static, and cannot be diverged from without compromising the spirit of this fraternity. Those landmarks, the foundation of Freemasonry, should indeed be steadfast. However, this notion of rigid inflexibility is often unnecessarily applied to all aspects of the lodge and its activities.

The phrase "the Suburban way" is spoken often in our lodge, and the spirit in which it is used is noble even if its meaning is anything but definite. What

"the Suburban way" is will differ depending on who you ask. I am sure we are not alone in this dilemma, as it is certainly a difficulty faced by any organization, Masonic or otherwise, comprised of those that are passionate to preserve the past as they know it to be. The trouble is that these traditions, no matter how minor or unimportant they may be, are heartily clung to as though the entire edifice of Freemasonry would come tumbling down should they not be adhered to; as if a single action or word could contain such power!

Many traditions are important-they have meaning for those that started them, and for those that continue them onward. However, not everything that has been done over and over in the same fashion is necessarily meaningful nor worthy to be designated as a tradition. Yet, it seems practically anything related to the lodge is regulated as such and thus is treated as though it were a landmark: rigid and unwavering. Of course, there is no ill intention in doing so, it is merely to preserve the past-"To carry on "the Suburban way."

However, my brothers who so long to maintain such history neglect the past themselves! They forget that once upon a time, there were no burgundy jackets adorning our officers. They do not remember that the social club and fish fry did not come about until

They fail to recall that we did not always enjoy such kinship and trade degree work with lodges in Indiana and Tennessee, or create gift bags for our widows, or have a chili cook-off or any number of great things this lodge does. Indeed, our lodge's history is rich with improvements and innovations. Were it not, it might surely have faltered long ago. As we move into the future, we must bring along all the great things this lodge and fraternity have done and can offer, be strong enough to leave behind that which is unnecessary, irrelevant, or broken and to evolve into a fraternity that continues to have value for men of decades to come.

A hymn from my church's service this morning contained the lyric, "My foot carries days of old into new, our dreaming shows us the way." What a beautiful way to express the importance of the past and the vision of the future. There is another meaning in this line as well; we cannot go back. We must move forward or we do not move at all. Once we become stagnate, are no longer relevant, we will no longer attract new men to the craft and we will fall.

I have faith that this will not happen. Perhaps we have momentarily lost our way, and the size of our beloved fraternity is a fraction of what it once was. However, our feet will carry the days of old -- when Freemasonry was on the rise--into the new, and our dreaming of how the fraternity can be in the future will show us the way. We will remember that our organization has changed over time to stay relevant to both the men whom have long stood as pillars in this institution as well as those just being placed in the Northeast corner, and we will once again discover a way to find the necessary balance; to carry forth the important principles and traditions without fear of the necessary changes just as our forefathers have done. These things we must do, for we are the stewards of Freemasonry for future generations.




