Charles S Hoskinson personally administered the obligations and esoteric instruc-That evening Taft witnessed the tions. Master's degree conferred by Kilwinning Lodge No. 356, of Cincinnati, which elected him to membership April 14, 1909.

Crescent Lodge No. 25, Cedar Rapids, lowa, elected him an Honorary Member June 5, 1918. On April 22, 1909, he visited Temple-Noyes Lodge No. 32, at Washington, D.C., of which his close friend and aide, Major Archie Butt, was a member and for whom, after the Titanic disaster, Temple -Noyes Lodge held an elaborate Memorial Service which Brother Taft attended as one of the Chief Mourners. He visited the famous American Union Lodge No. 1, at Marietta, Ohio, June 15, 1910; May 9th of the same year he posed for a picture in Washington's Masonic regalia at the White house; May 13th he visited St John's Lodge No. 1. Newark N.J., to help celebrate its 150th anniversary; on December 27, 1914, he addressed the Grand Lodge of Massachusetts, and on June 5, 1918, he spoke to Crescent Lodge No. 25 of Cedar Rapids, Iowa. He dies March 8, 1930.



Masonic **Presidents:** William

velt, 26th President (1901-

1909), was born in New York City, October 27, 1858. He was initiated January 2nd, passed March 27th and raised April 24, 1901, in Matinecock Lodge No. 806, Oyster Bay, New York. Pentalpha Lodge No. 23, D.C., made him an Honorary Member April 4, 1904, as did the Illinois Masonic Veterans Association in 1903.

Roosevelt's interest in the Fraternity was often expressed and his visits to Lodges were not only in this country, also abroad. November 5, 11902, he attended the Grand Lodge of Pennsylvania celebration of Washington's initiation in Philadelphia; in Washington, D.C., February 21, 1903, he honored the Masonic ceremonies of laying the cornerstone of the Army War College with his presence; May 26, 1903, he broke ground for a Masonic temple at Spokane, Washington; April 14, 1906, he attended the Masonic cornerstone laying of the House of representatives Building in Wash-

ington, D.C., where he delivered the address, presenting a bound copy of it to the Grand Master, inscribed: "To Walter A. Brown, Esq., Grand Master of Masons, from Brother Theodore Roosevelt," and June 8, 1907, he work Masonic Regalia and delivered an address at then laying of the cornerstone of the New Masonic Temple, Washington, D.C. In 1942, Bro Harold was drafted into the US Army and served in the field artillery. He was stationed at Ft. Sill, Oklahoma, Ft. Rilev, Kansas, and Ft, Leonard Wood, Missouri. For 2 years he was fighting in France and Germany and he was discharged in May 1946.

He was married to Miss Flora Johnson in Louisville, KY in 1950. He and his bride had 3 children, 1 boy and 2 girls. His first, son Wilbert, 60, has 3 children. Daughter Debbie, 59, has 1 daughter. Lastly, his daughter Sandra Kay, 55, has 2 children. So along with 6 grand children, Harold also has 3 great-grand children. Unfortunately, Harold lost his beloved wife a few months ago.

Truck driving has been a big part of Harold's life. He started driving in 1946 and drove many years for several companies before retiring.

Harold joined St. Matthews Lodge # 906 and received his EA in 1949. He received his MM in 1961. He is also a dual member at Fairdale 942. He is Past Master of St Matthews 906 (1965 & 1978). He is a member of the Order of the Eastern Star and a 48 year member of The Scottish Rite, Valley of Louisville.

Jim was married to Diann Rutherford in 1958. He was a junior at Male and she had just graduated. Their marriage was blessed with 3 sons: Greg, Mike and Bo, and 1 daughter, Mitzi. They have 8 grandchildren: 5 girls and 3 boys. And they are even more blessed as they have 2 great-grandchildren.

Jim moved around a lot in his work life. He taught at Iroquois High School, then moved to Colorado Springs, Colorado for 3 years where he was head football coach. He was at Jeffersontown High School for 8 years, Campbellsville High for 2 years, Male High for 7 years and Butler High for 8 years. He retired at the end of his time at Butler in 2000. **Burl Ives** by Julian Endsley, 32, K.C.C.H.

A brother reminisces regarding his participation in the raising

of Burl Ives as a Freemason.

After a very busy period of work for the President's Handicap Committee in 1975, Burl Icle Ives and his wife, Dorothy, sat relaxing on the veranda of their home overlooking Hollywood, Ca.. Random thoughts played in their conversation about what they had done during the year and what might come next in their lives.

They had performed numerous concerts on a world tour, and, starting in 1969, they had been early ambassadors for environmental efforts under the auspices of U.S. Secretary of Interior Walter Hickle. Finally, Dorothy said, "Burl, you have done so much for everyone else, is there something you have wanted to do just for yourself and have simply never done it?"

I've always wanted to be a Mason. My father was a Mason and my brothers are, and my sister, Audrey, was Worthy Grand Matron in Eastern Star in Illinois.

That conversation marked Burl's decision to ask for a petition, but even a year before, in 1974, he had started to think seriously about becoming a Mason. He had read a script about the Constitutional Convention in Philadelphia. He considered playing the part of Ben Franklin and found out that he had been Grand Master of Pennsylvania. Having admired Bro. Franklin so much, it reminded him of all his family being Masons and inspired him to petition to join Masonry.

On Aug. 5, 1975, he petitioned Magnolia Lodge No. 242 in Santa Barbara, Ca, and in Sept he was made an EA, beginning a 19 year period of Masonic service. Bro. Burl asked for no special treatment in his proficiency trials and never received any. He was especially anxious to get his M.M. degree. He couldn't wait to obtain more of the philosophical and moral precepts which build one upon the other, each adding meaning to daily life and the high conduct Masons are taught to practice. In all his degrees, he was alert and intense. He focused his attention tightly on the Working Tools and the words describing them.

At the conclusion of the Third Degree, Burl made a few king remarks to the assembled Brethren to express his pleasure in what he had seen of Masonry and his delight in being a part of it. He was impressed at the

dignity of the Fraternity and amazed at the volume of material in which the Officers were so totally proficient. As a performer, he said he had some knowledge of the effort required to memorize that much oratory. With perfect ease, he charmed the crowd with his sincerity and warmth. Brushing aside any air one might expect from an internationally known celebrity, he humbly became "one of the boys," a Master Mason, and proud of it. Burl was given a beautiful Masonic ring, designed by his wife, Dorothy.

Retiring to the dining room, the Brethren were charmed to see another aspect of Burt's wonderful personality. With quick wit and good fellowship, he bantered with the Brethren, swapped a few light-hearted jokes and even a solid belly laugh or two.

And there was one surprising event. It was the custom of the Lodge to use the services of members of several DeMolay, Rainbow Girls, and Job's Daughters to serve refreshments. That night, three DeMolays were serving and they were called forward to meet Burl. As the boys shook hands with Burl, they were totally surprised that he gave them the DeMolay handshake, since they didn't know he became one of them in 1927. And to demonstrate his DeMolay service, he put on an apron and served coffee for all takers!

After his death on April 14, 1995, his wife discussed that Burl often reminisced about his raising. He was extremely impressed by the beauty of the ritual, the symbolism, and the intellectual pageantry which gave a wealth of wisdom and a depth of meaning previously unknown to the spiritual life already existing but only partially developed within him.

Masonry was a wonderful adjunct to that spirituality he had learned in home and church in his formative years. Finally, some time after receiving his Scottish Rite and York Degrees, he told his wife that the Third Degree is "the bottom line", the foundation of all Masonic learning and moral conduct, qualities he saw and held in high regard among Masons.

Bro. Burl belonged to many Masonic organizations during his life. His wife, Dorothy, donated his many, many awards and mementos to The House of the Temple, the headquarters of the Southern Jurisdiction Scottish Rite in Washington, D.C. There is a room dedicated to his life and the work he pursued. He will always be remembered a talented actor, performer and singer, but to us, his brothers, he will be remembered as a Man among Men in the Masonic Fraternity. (Sub. By Bill Harvey, P.M.)
