From the Junior Warden Mark Galloway

At one time in the history of the Masonic Fraternity, men flocked to our doors in search of something better

for their lives. So at various points in American history, our membership grew by leaps and bounds. But as of late, this is not the case, not only for the Masons but for all fraternal groups. Listed below are a few things that I have seen happening that is causing the demise of Masonic Lodges.

- 1. *Health problems* a very real block to Lodge attendance, especially for our older members. Whether it is because of a family member being ill or the Mason himself, it is hard to attend if someone doesn't feel like attending.
- 2. **Transportation difficulties** many older members can't see to drive at night, or don't have reliable transportation. This is where our Lodges have fallen down by not trying to get transport for older Masons.
- 3. *Financial distress* many, many Masons are on a fixed income and can't afford the gas or the yearly dues to belong to his Lodge.
- 4. **Relocation** sometimes it is very hard to relocate and fall back into Lodge attendance due to location of a Lodge or just meeting new people.
- 5. **Beliefs change** some Masons change their views on membership in the Masonic Order, possibly due to joining a different church.
- 6. *Family opposition* some family members just don't want their husband or father to be gone from home.
- 7. *Lack of time* time is a determining factor when one has to decide how to divide up their day for church, clubs, Lodge, etc.
- 8. **Disharmony and cliques** we all have a tendency to hang with those who think and talk like us (a clique) thus causing disharmony with those you don't associate with. This is very harmful to the fellowship Masons should be cultivating.
- 9. *Discrimination against others* who are not of the same ethnic or religious group as yourself. This can be very destructive to any Lodge.
- 10. **Boredom** "Is this all there is?" The Lodge is not all about the short meetings we have, but about the fellowship we cultivate together, helping each other and helping others in need.
- 11. Lack of attention affecting attendance listen to what the Master and others have to say, don't contribute to

disturbances in your Lodge.

- 12. *Fear of examination* at your local Lodge, if you have an up-to-date dues card, someone will know you and you will get in. Have you heard of the Tyler's Oath? Learn it, it's not very long, and you probably can get into any Masonic Lodge.
- 13. *Involvement with other groups* unfortunately, too many men join Masonry in order to get into other appendant Masonic groups. What a slap in the face of your Lodge. If it weren't for your Blue Lodge, you wouldn't be in any of the other groups. Shame on those who do that and forget about their Lodge.
- 14. *Uncomfortable after a long absence from Lodge* so what? Come on back to Lodge and just get over it! It happens to us all.
- 15. *Different work and schedules* it happens, but please try to be there when you can. It won't kill you to take a day off once a year in order to attend Lodge.
- 16. *Multiple memberships* they cost money and require your time if you attend them all. Try to make it to your Blue Lodge a few times a year if possible.
- 17. **Security** older members don't like to be alone at night in order to go to Lodge. Try to go with a couple of other brothers as there is safety in numbers.
- 18. **Priority** sometimes one has to prioritize activities in their lives and sometimes Lodge is first to go! Try to not get rid of your membership, but come occasionally if you can.
- 19. *Lodge mergers* it is a fact of life now that Lodges do merge when each Lodge doesn't have enough members to pay the bills. Come to your new merged Lodge and get to know the new Masons you may not have known before.
- 20. **Don't like change** who does? Remember, the only thing that doesn't change is the fact that things do change. Work into change slowly and you will eventually get used to the changes.
- 21. "They don't do degree work the way they used to". Yes, some changes do happen, especially in how meanings change due to the old ways not being taught anymore. Don't like it? Then come to Lodge and be a part of keeping the old ways alive. Don't always blame changes on others. Your Lodge needs you there to help keep up their traditions.
- 22. *Unmasonic conduct of others* don't just talk about it, be a part of making sure everyone follows the rules and does things right.
- 23. *Disagreements* whether it be politics, behavior, standards, bullying, put-downs or cliques, stand up for what you think is right. No one is correct all the time, including you, so be a little more understanding of others.

This is just a summary of items that can and do keep Brother Masons from attending Lodge. After you finish reading this and if you feel a little guilty about not attending your Lodge, try and make an effort to correct some of the items listed and become a part of the solution and not part of the problem. I would also like to add something about the brothers who leave lodge early on degree work nights. I realize that morning comes around pretty early especially if you work. Some of the brothers make it a habit to leave after the first section, like their parts done, goodnight. Think back brothers when you went through the degrees and joined lodge. What if everyone had gone home when you were raised? What kind of impression would it have made on you at that time?

We (unfortunately) don't have degree work all that often, try to stay, it will impress the new brother and maybe he will want to come back. I have seen a new brother leave a packed lodge room to change clothes and come back to an empty lodge with only the necessary officers to finish and congratulate him. This is sure sad to say but I have even seen brothers sneak out when the lights go out during the obligation. Shame on you! Our lodge will only be as great as its members make it.





"I was stopped at a red light at a busy intersection, just lost in thought about the Lord and how good He is, and I didn't notice that the light had changed. It is a good thing someone else loves Jesus; because if he hadn't honked, I'd never have noticed."

"I found that **lots** of people love Jesus. Why, while I was sitting there, the nice man behind me started honking like crazy, and he leaned out of his window and screamed, "For the love of God, GO! GO!" What an exuberant cheerleader he was for the Lord."

"Everyone started honking! I just leaned out of my window and started waving and smiling at all these loving people. I even honked my horn a few times to share in the love. There must have been a man from Florida back there, because I heard him yelling something about a "sunny beach." I saw another man waving in a funny way with only his middle finger stuck up in the air. When I asked my teenage grandson in the back seat what that meant, he said that it was an Hawaiian good luck sign or something. Well, I've never met anyone from Hawaii, so I leaned out the window and gave him the good luck sign back. My grandson burst out laughing; why even he was enjoying this religious experience."

"A couple of the people were so caught up in the joy of the moment that they got out of their cars and started walking towards me. I bet they wanted to pray, or ask what church I attended, but this is when I noticed the light had changed. So I waved to all my sisters and brothers, smiled at them all, and drove on through the intersection. I noticed I was the only car that got through the intersection before the light changed again, and I felt kind of sad that I had to leave them after all the love we had shared, so I slowed the car down, leaned out of the window, and gave them all the Hawaiian good luck sign one last time as I drove away. Praise the Lord for such wonderful folks!"

Now I love senior grandmothers. I'm married to one. But I don't share the grandmother's story about how courteous other drivers are on the road. I'm convinced that a lot of drivers on our highways today are either nuts or have a death wish. A person driving a huge truck ten feet from the car in front of him, at 75 miles per hour, is about two seconds away from killing himself and everybody in the car in front if the car slows down or the truck driver is distracted. And it happens more and more often. This is insane. Tailgaters should lose their licenses, and have to ride with senior grandmothers.

I also can't understand why people drive 75 in a 65 mph zone. And the speed limit on Interstates and Expressways in Kentucky will soon be increased to 70, which means drivers will then drive 80. I arrive at my destination safely, because I started early enough to get there on time, even if I was delayed by an accident caused by the speeders or tailgaters.

So come on, folks. Observe driving laws. Drive safely --- for yourself --- for your family ---- and for **me**. If a speeder, a tailgater, or someone with a cell phone stuck in their ear kills me, I'm going to be really mad!

One-pan Cheesy Grits with Eggs and Bacon

12 -strips bacon

- 1- cup coarse-ground white grits
- 2 -cups water or more, if needed
- 2- cups milk
- 2 -teaspoons salt
- 1- teaspoon ground white pepper
- 1- cup sharp white Cheddar
- 6- large eggs

Set a large, 12-inch sauté pan over medium-low heat. Place the bacon in the pan, 6 strips at a time and cook until rendered and crisp, about 4 to 5 minutes per side. Repeat with the remaining bacon and set aside.

Pour off the fat from the pan and return to the heat. Add the water, milk and grits to the pan. Bring to a boil and reduce the heat to a simmer. Cook the grits, covered, stirring often, until soft and most of the liquid has been absorbed, 45 minutes to 1 1/2 hours depending on the grits. Add more water (a half cup at a time), if necessary.

Once the grits are cooked to the desired degree of tenderness, season with 1 teaspoon of the salt and 1/2 teaspoon of the pepper. Add the cheese and stir well to combine. Crack 5 eggs around the perimeter of the saute pan in a five point star pattern, and 1 egg in the center, and season with the remaining salt and pepper. Place 2 strips of bacon in an X pattern over each egg and return the lid to the grits. Continue to cook, undisturbed, until the whites of the eggs are set and the yolks are still runny, about 12 minutes. Remove the lid and serve the grits by scooping the eggs and bacon with the grits onto plates or shallow bowls. (For folks who like their eggs cooked more, simply stirring the eggs into the hot grits when served will cook the yolks further
