



Chocolate Chip Pecan Pie

INGREDIENTS:

- 3 eggs
- 1 1/2 cups white sugar
- 1/2 cup all-purpose flour
- 6 tablespoons butter, melted
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon lemon juice
- 1/2 cup corn syrup
- 1 1/2 cups semisweet chocolate chips
- 1 1/2 cups chopped pecans
 1 recipe pastry for a 9 inch single crust pie

DIRECTIONS:

- 1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees F (175 degrees C).
- 2. In a large mixing bowl beat eggs until light and fluffy. Add sugar, flour, melted butter or margarine, salt, lemon juice, and corn syrup. Mix thoroughly, then stir in chocolate chips and pecans. Pour mixture into pie shell.

3. Bake in preheated oven for 45 minutes or until set and golden.

The Masonic emblem, consisting of the square, compass and letter G, was never used to a great extent for commercial purposes. Between the years 1810 thru 1834 "Old Sheffield Razors made by the Lummus Co. were labeled with the Masonic square and compass. The Poindexter and Orr Ranch in the Montana Territory registered the first cattle brand in 1864, made with the square and compass. Koch Industries, which still uses this brand, gave one of their branding irons to the Grand Lodge of Montana.

When the owner of a flour mill in the late 1800's decided to use this emblem on his flour bags, a suit was brought against him. Even tho there was no trademark protection as such, the courts decided that the square and compass was so clearly identified with Freemasonry that he was stopped from using it. In 1872, the American Commissioner of Patents ruled that the square and compass emblem could not be used as a trademark or trade name for any commercial purposes.

In England, in the 1880's, there were two companies making ginger beer with the Masonic emblem on its label. Also, one company was putting out "Master Mason Tobacco".

In 1992, the Grand Lodge of Pennsylvania registered the square and compass for their jurisdiction and the Masonic Service Assn. of North America. Since there was no U.S. Masonic national authority, each Grand Lodge would have to register independently.

According to the Grand Lodge of Michigan Constitutions and By-Laws, any non-mason that uses the names and emblems (square and compass) can be taken to court. Any freemason who does the same can be charged with un-Masonic criminal charges.

The Grand Lodge of Scotland has a copyright in place for the square and compass with the letter G.

Although the state of Idaho has no formal policy on the usage of the square and compass, the brethren are free to use it to promote Freemasonry. And in 2001, the Grand Lodge of New Zealand registered the mason's mark.


So it would seem that there are those who would use the square and compass to promote more than Freemasonry. Who would have thought it?
