Bro. Paul was born in Lawrence County, Tennessee on July 5^{th} , 1924 and was raised up there also.

He went to Five Point Public School there in the county.

In 1941, with the world going to war, Paul graciously accepted an offer from his Uncle Sam and joined the U.S. Army and served in the South Pacific from 1941-1945. He served in the anti-aircraft division, was a truck driver and like lots of GI's, did whatever he was directed to do. Paul didn't say, but I'm sure that he saw lots of action on some of the islands he served on.

After the war drew to a conclusion, Paul married Miss Gladys Mayfield in 1945 and they had 3 boys and 1 daughter. He is the proud grand father of 6 grand children and also has 8 great grand children. Paul and Gladys were married 55 years when she passed on Feb 1st, 2000. They were both dedicated to each other.

Paul worked 32 years in the warehouse of the old A & P supermarket here in Louisville. He retired from there when they closed in 1982. He then worked for one of his sons from 83-95. So Paul is now really retired and works at the Fish stand on Friday mornings, helping with the slaw and onion crew.

He joined Suburban 740 in 1968 and has been a member here ever since.

It seems that quail hunting and fishing have been Paul's favorite pastimes, but he doesn't do much of either any more.

After the closing, even though I had a ride, I was offered a ride back to my hotel. I did appreciate the thought.



Recent TV coverage of the Ghosts of Waverly Hills TB Sanitarium reminded me of an incident experienced by my wife and I in Harlan County on August 5, 1999. It was the occasion of our fiftieth wedding anniversary. Although we had a church wedding in 1949, it had been a small, simple ceremony,

and as our fiftieth anniversary approached we decided to go all out with an elaborate ceremony we couldn't afford fifty years ago. We spent two months planning a larger, formal ceremony, at the same church, and at the same time as the original ceremony.

After several trips to Harlan, about 250 miles from Louisville, the church and the minister were scheduled, the reception hall, caterers and photographers were secured, and hotel reservations were made for our family and out of town guests. My wife found a wedding gown she liked in a shop in LaGrange, I bought a tuxedo, and everything was ready.

Our plans came together without a hitch, and everything went beautifully. We had reserved the honeymoon suite at the School House Inn in Harlan County. A large high school had been closed, and the building was remodeled into an impressive and very unique hotel. Original hallways and student lockers had been retained. The class rooms were modified into large beautiful guest rooms and suites. Fireplaces had been added to many of the rooms, and they were furnished with antiques. The gymnasium had been converted into a large banquet room, and teachers offices and lounge became private dining rooms. The honeymoon suite was fabulous, with fireplace, Jacuzzi, and all the trimmings.

We went to bed about midnight, and about 2 o'clock we were jolted awake by loud noises just outside our door --- lockers slamming in the hallway --- children laughing and yelling --- a basketball bouncing --- I couldn't believe parents would allow their children to play in the hallways of a hotel at that hour in the morning.

We had had a fantastic day, but now we were tired, and needed sleep. The noise continued. After a few minutes I got out of bed and opened the door to yell at the kids to cut out the noise and go to bed.

When I opened the door the noise stopped, but I could hear feet running. There were dim lights in the hall, and I saw several shadows disappear around the corner into

another hallway. I assumed the kids were gone and went back to bed.

But they came back. A short time later the laughing, playing, ball bouncing and slamming lockers began again, but this time they came from the hall around the corner. I quietly crept over to the door, jerked it open, and ran just a few feet around the corner. The shadows and shapes quickly disappeared again, but not before I distinctly saw that they were the shape and size of children, and although they weren't running they were moving quickly, and their footsteps were loud. I gave up and went back to bed. Although I heard them again a little later, this time I didn't get up.

When we checked out the next morning the desk clerk asked us if we enjoyed the amenities in the honeymoon suite. We told her we very much enjoyed it, but we were disturbed three times by children playing in the hallways. She laughed, and said the kids must have liked us. I said that was a strange comment. She said the hotel had only three rooms occupied that night, and there were no children in the entire hotel.

Now I knew what we had both heard, and what I had seen, and said she must be mistaken. Yes, we had each had a glass of pink champagne, as has been our custom for every anniversary for the past fifty years, but one glass of champagne doesn't make you hallucinate. Their laughing, yelling, slamming locker doors and bouncing basketballs just outside our door had awakened us from a sound sleep. There were definitely children in that hotel last night.

The clerk was very apologetic that we had been disturbed, and explained to us that the children were said to be spirits of former students who loved the school, and they were harmless. They sometimes made themselves known to people they liked, and of course, being spirits, they knew about our fifty years of marriage, knew how happy we had been, and how much our rededication ceremony had meant to us.

We quickly mellowed, and told the clerk that we have no fear of spirits, and if we had known they were celebrating our fifty years of marriage we would have joined them in their revelry, and it would have been the perfect end to a perfect ceremony.

When we go back to School House Inn for our sixtieth wedding anniversary in 2009, we will again request the honeymoon suite, and look forward to seeing the spirit children again --- only this time they will be *invited* guests.




Wise Indian
