
I want to thank everyone at Suburban lodge for the privilege of serving as your master this year. It was the thrill of my life and I hope I haven`t let you down.

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KENTUCKY LONG RIFLE



Brothers, our Grand Master, Most Worshipful L. Todd Eastham has continued the tradition of previous grand masters, by sponsoring a charity. He has taken it one step beyond as I will explain shortly. His charity is to help establish a community based service program for people who have medical needs but can't or don't know where to turn. Kosair has kicked this off with a grant and the Grand Lodge of KY is trying to raise \$200,000 this year by raffling a one of a kind Kentucky long rifle.

This working replica of an original flintlock rifle would be like ones the earliest masons in KY carried. Brother Todd and his company, L. Todd Eastham and Assoc. had this rifle commissioned and made and then donated it to the Grand lodge.

This is one beautiful piece with gold Masonic emblem, nameplate etc. It also comes with 2 different size powder horns and a leather shoulder bag all with Masonic markings.

This rifle will be given away next year at the annual communication in October and you can be the proud owner. I will be selling tickets at \$20 each this year. You also receive a special Kentucky Frontiersman lapel pin with each ticket you buy. If you care to buy several tickets, you will also receive an extra special item.

A Prayer for More Light in Kentucky Masonry

Recently, the Worshipful Master, Mark Galloway, informed us that at the Annual Communica-

tion of the Grand Lodge of Kentucky (GLK), a delegation from the Prince Hall Masonic Lodge (PHML) presented a Resolution by their Lodge formally recognizing the GLK and asking for recognition in return. As I am informed is customary in these matters, a vote was then held by the GLK on whether or not to hold it over (i.e., PHML's request for recognition) until the next Annual Communication, and the vote came back in favor of doing so.

With this matter now headed for a vote at the GLK's Annual Communication, I am reminded of my first known encounter with a member of the PHML. He was introduced to me by my then future son-in-law at a Memorial Day cook out. My son-in-law, Major Grant Stoebner, was then a Captain at Fort Knox, soon to be initiated as an Entered Apprentice at Camp Knox Lodge. Knowing that I had just been raised to the sublime degree of a Master Mason a couple of months earlier, Grant introduced me to Mark Stevenson, his First Sergeant, telling me that we had something in common, inasmuch as First Sergeant Stevenson was a Prince Hall Mason.

At that time, I had not yet read Solomon's Builders by Christopher Hodapp, author of Freemasons for Dummies. Accordingly, I was a "dummy" when it came to any knowledge of the PHML, or that, as I later learned from Hodapp's book, as of 2006, the GLK was one of only eleven (11) state Grand Lodges that did not recognize the PHML. Thus, I did not realize that First Sergeant Mark Stevenson was only my "brother" in God's eyes but not in the eyes of the GLK, and that he was as "clandestine" to me as I was to him. Nonetheless, given the celebratory occasion with others milling about, we did not communicate Masonically but rather on matters of mutual interest.

I learned that First Sergeant Stevenson, a young man in his late twenties or early thirties, recently had returned from Iraq. I knew from the history of the Iraq War that he had been serving in a particularly violent area of the country during a particularly violent time of the war. He confirmed that his unit had seen quite a bit of action. He also told me that he and others in his unit had formed a Masonic Lodge while in Iraq, and he clearly was very proud of that fact.

During the twenty to thirty minutes we spent together, enjoying the cookout fare of the holiday and good conversation on many subjects, the First Sergeant's patriotic love of country, his sense of duty and honor, and his faith in Almighty God was obvious. I remember coming away from our chance encounter even more thoroughly convinced than ever that I had chosen wisely to make the request of my own free will and accord to become a Mason, and that I was most assuredly fortunate to be admitted and received into such an ancient and honorable institution whose light obviously served as a beacon to such men who were among the brightest and best our country could offer.

Months later, when I learned the truth from Hodapp's book, I was sorely disappointed. It was an ugly truth that could not be squared with the Divine Truth I had learned in the various Masonic lectures, illuminated by the Three Great Lights of Masonry, and from the basic goodness and decency of my Lodge brothers, who have taught me much about Faith, Hope and Charity and human equality before the all-seeing eye of the Divine Creator.

It is my hope and fervent praver, that at the next Annual Communication of the GLK that the Master of the Universe will inspire the Masters of the various Lodges of Kentucky in attendance with wisdom from on high, to vote in favor of extending a hand of Masonic friendship to those who likewise travel in search of more light in Masonry and returning in kind recognition to the PHML. Then, and only then, perhaps some evening my brothers and I at Suburban Lodge #740 Free & Accepted Masons will have the distinct honor to receive a visit from and to sit in Lodge with First Sergeant Mark Stevenson, a man of honor and a brother.

Amen. So mote it be.


