

ROWLAND'S RAMBLINGS

I recently had an e-mail from a reader who asked if I once wrote a column for the Fairdale Citizen and the Shively Newsweek. Yes, I wrote weekly columns for these and other news-papers over the last 45 years under headings called Rowland's Reflections, The Old Philosopher, and This-n-That.

I am still a contributing writer for the Harlan Daily Enterprise, my hometown newspaper in Harlan County, Kentucky. I grew up in Harlan before we came to Louisville fifty years ago, but things are different there now, and the paper wants stories from the nineteen thirties and forties, when coal was the king industry.

Things have changed everywhere now. Times have changed, towns have changed, and people have changed. Today there are diverse industries in Harlan County. Now a major interstate highway passes within a few miles of the tri-state area of Kentucky, Virginia and Tennessee, where several state parks offer the most beautiful mountain scenery in the world.

Harlan County is nestled in the middle of this area where tourism has become a major industry. The county has become the All Terrain Vehicle capitol of the world, and is listed in the Guinness Book of World Records as having had more than 1100 vehicles from a dozen states forming a nine mile parade into the hundreds of miles of off-road mountain trails to be traversed by all kinds of ATV 4-wheelers. ATV trailheads and numerous tourist attractions have sprung up all over the mountain area there.

Black bears have returned to Kingdom Come State Park in Harlan County, a coal mining town and museum is in full swing, and a coal mine has been reopened for tourists to tour and learn how coal was extracted from the mountains several years ago. A high school building has been converted into the "High School Inn," and the guest rooms are beautifully furnished with antiques. A country club and golf course leaves little to be desired. The county of fifty years has changed, and has become thoroughly modern.

But Harlan County isn't the only place where things have changed. Change is inevitable. As time passes things change. Towns, businesses, houses, even the contour of the land changes as new highways and new buildings are built. Eventually *everything* changes.

And of course people change along with everything else. Age is probably the major factor that changes our lives. Are you the same person you were forty years ago --- twenty years ago --- even ten years ago? Of course not. Our habits, our likes and dislikes, our health and our

attitudes change as we get older. It happens to all of us. We can't stop it.

As I grew older my habits, tastes and desires have made a turnaround. I once disliked Chinese food --now I love it. I once liked slacks and button-up shirts --now I prefer denims and pullover shirts. I once loved to go
to the movies --- now I prefer buying or renting a movie
and watching it from my Lazy Boy, on my big screen TV,

Sometimes, as I reminisce about the "good old days" of the thirties, forties and fifties, I remember that we lived without microwaves, dishwashers, icemakers, televisions, computers, and remote controls, and think that the "good old days" weren't so good after all. Times change.

Of course the inevitable change that occurs in all of us eventually is our physical appearance. Sure, we'd like to look like we did when we were in high school, and we sometimes try to give that impression when we attend our high school reunion, but it never works. I've attended a lot of my high school reunions, but I've never seen one woman that still looked like any girl I dated in those days

At a high school reunion I attended a few years ago I was talking to one of my old cronies from the forties. He had lost his wife a couple of years before, and was at the reunion hoping to find one of his old girl friends that was single. He had put on extra weight and had a paunch around his middle now. He said, "Joe, I can suck my belly in, but I can't hold it in long enough to get a girl friend. " I felt sorry for the poor guy.
