"A sight to behold" - Brother George Washington's gavel

On Thursday, September 24th, the Grand Lodge of Kentucky officers participated in the symbolic act of laying the cornerstone at the new national headquarters for the American Sons of the Revolution located on Main Street here in Louisville. I felt very fortunate, along with your Master, to have been invited to witness this historic event. The current headquarters building is at 4th and Kentucky Sts in Louisville. Much research went into obtaining a larger building in order to have the needed space the new place will afford.

As the building has no actual cornerstone, a brass plaque was installed on the southwest corner of the building front. Since it was raining quite hard, all activities were moved inside. Most Worshipful Grand Master Herman Forrester dedicated the cornerstone with corn, wine and oil. It was really an impressive ceremony.

To me, the thing that made the ceremony most enjoyable was the fact that Bro. George Washington's gavel that he used to lay the Capitol Building cornerstone was on display for all to see. It was made from a piece of white marble from the material used in building the Capitol. The handle is of cherry wood and there is a golden metal covering one side of the head, which is engraved with writing about the gavel.

What was extremely enjoyable was the fact that I was allowed to hold the gavel. First you have to don a pair of white gloves and then you hold the gavel with both hands. It did send a chill up my back holding a gavel that eleven presidents have used setting cornerstones across America.

I understand that it took quite some time to get permission to bring the gavel to Louis-ville and it was quite expensive for the travel and security of said gavel. So I was really impressed that Kentucky Masonry was accorded this once in a lifetime honor. Please see the article about the history of this American icon elsewhere in this newsletter.

The George Washington Gavel

One of the most visible aspects of the Masonic fraternity is its long tradition of ceremonially laying the cornerstones of many public and private buildings. This tradition contains great meaning for Masons, and ties the fraternity closely to many cities around the country, including Washington, DC.

The historic George Washington Gavel was among the Masonic implements used by Worshipful Brother George Washington when he performed the ceremonial cornerstone laying for the united States Capital building on September 18, 1793 as Worshipful Master of Alexandria-Washington Lodge No. 22 of Virginia. Also participating in the ceremony were Lodge No. 9 of Maryland (now Potomac Lodge No. 5) and Lodge No. 15 of Maryland (now Federal Lodge No. 1, F.A.A.M., of DC).

The head of the Washington Gavel is made of the same Maryland marble originally used in the interior of the Capitol, and its handle is crafted of a dark, native American cherry of unique grain. It was made specifically for this purpose by one John Duffy, who also made the other Masonic tools used that day. John Duffy was a silversmith by trade, and was married to a daughter of

President Washington's gardener; he is also reputed to be a member of the President's mother Lodge, Fredericksburg Lodge No. 4 of Virginia.

The ceremonies of the day were carried out with great care and solemnity, and were well attended both by Masonic and civic leaders. Newspaper accounts of the event recall a grand procession from the north shore of the Potomac River in what is now Georgetown to the site of the Capitol, with spectators cheering every step of the way. Although the Capitol was at the time a simple hole in the ground in the middle of a forest, the dignity afforded to its cornerstone spoke volumes about the hope that it represented. To wit, President Washington's closing prayer follows:

"Certainly my dear brethren, it must be as grateful to you as it is to me, to possess the great pleasure of laying this corner stone, which we hope, expect and sincerely pray to produce innumerable corner stones; and that on every one of them, may spring immense edifices. We fervently pray to the Great Grand Master of Heaven, earth and all things, of his infinite wisdom, strength, goodness and mercy, to grant. So may it be."

At the conclusion of the ceremony, President Washington gave the silver trowel he used to his own Lodge, Alexandria-Washington No. 22 of Virginia;, and presented the Gavel to the Worshipful Master of Lodge No. 9 of Maryland, Valentine Reintzel. It is likely that the Gavel was given to Lodge No. 9 because it was the older of the two Maryland Lodges participating in the ceremony.

Most Worshipful Brother Reintzel, who in 1811 became the first Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Free And Accepted Masons of the District of Columbia, retained personal possession of the Gavel until his death in 1817. At that time his family returned the Gavel to Lodge No. 9, then and now known as Potomac Lodge No. 5, F.A.A.M. of the District of Columbia, and it was kept locked with the other possessions of the Lodge at its regular meeting place until 1922. On 18 December 1922, it was moved to Riggs National Bank (now PNC), where it has remained since.

I'm tired! My wife

and I have just returned from our high school reunion in Harlan County, Kentucky. It was my 65th and my wife's 60th reunion. We drove hundreds of miles and stayed several days visiting places where we grew up and reminiscing about the "good ole days", when we were young and carefree and life was so much simpler.

We enjoyed our visit, and renewed some old friendships with people we had not seen for several years. It was fun, but something just didn't feel right. Then it slowly dawned on me — of course, we had moved away from Harlan County more than fifty years ago. Everything had changed. It wasn't supposed to be exactly like I remembered it from years ago.

Highways that were once two lanes were now three and four lanes. Many of the small towns that I remembered had been bypassed by new roads. Where



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was Wallins, where I attended elementary school? It had been bypassed. Even the county seat at Harlan had been bypassed. And where were Brookside, High Splint, and Louellen? They weren't even there any more. The hundreds of houses that dotted those communities had all been torn down. Some entire communities were gone, and new ones had sprung up. New shopping malls and theaters occupied hundreds of acres that had once been farm land. New supermarkets were there. Walmart was there. Fast food restaurants were everywhere. With the building of new roads modernization had taken over the entire county.

Whoa! What happened to the high school at Evarts, where my wife and I graduated in the nineteen forties? The beautiful, new, red brick building with hundreds of kids running in the halls and slamming lockers was a gutted shell now. It had stood in the way of progress, and along with three other high schools in the county had been closed. A huge, ultra modern, multi-million dollar complex that would accommodate all the students from the four old schools had been built.. It wasn't the nineteen forties and fifties any more.

But I think I got my biggest shock when I saw that the building where I had operated my dry cleaning business after returning from the Marine Corps in World War II had been demolished, I couldn't believe it. I loved that old building. I had spent eleven years of my life there, and now it was an overflow parking lot for Evarts city hall, and the police and fire departments. How could they do this to me?

The Evarts Congregational Christian Church where Eva and I got married more than 60 years ago was the only thing that hadn't changed much. It was a big, beautiful building then, and it's a beautiful building now. A new entrance had been built, and it is now a United Methodist Church, but we loved the church, and renewed our marriage vows there at our 50th anniversary ten years ago.

With the decline of the coal industry many people left Harlan county many years ago, and went to work in other states. Many of those people have retired now, and have moved back to spend their leisure years in the beautiful mountains of Harlan County. Today there are million dollar homes in Harlan County. A couple of homes even have helicopters parked on pads behind their houses, and they hop over to Knoxville, Tennessee or to another airport to board jets for longer trips. The mountains have become retirement escapes for them.

The mountains of Harlan County are simple beautiful. The scenery changes with the seasons, and every season is beautiful. Multi-colored wild flowers dot the hills and mountains in the spring. Snow blanketing everything in the winter makes the scenery a postcard picture.

Modern transportation and technology have made almost any place easily accessible now. We can live in the quiet country and still have the convenience of the city at our fingertips. Traveling to another country has become as easy as traveling to another state. Live in the beauty of the mountains and have the convenience of the city only a couple of hours away? Sure you can. And more and more people are doing it.

I love the mountains and I have drawn up elaborate plans to build a palatial summer home in Harlan County, nestled in a beautiful valley between Pine Mountain and Big Black Mountain, where the scenery is unequaled. And of course my private helicopter will be sitting ready for flight on the pad in the back yard, in case I want to catch a ball game in St. Louis or visit the aquarium in Cincinnati, or maybe zip back to Louisville to get the tooth brush I forgot.

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UPDATE ON BASEMENT....

As most of you are aware on August 4^{th} as we refer to it now as the Great Flood of 09, the basement here at the lodge took a direct hit and had 5 foot of water. We lost several old records going back to 1902, but we were able to recover many others. It's going to be a long process of drying them out and refilling them. I have them at home in my deep freeze, and we are taking them out a bag at a time and drying them slowly.

It has been 3 weeks now and we have started rebuilding the basement offices back and hope to be back in operation by the first of October. Some have expressed their concerns about us going back to the basement with our offices but this may never happen again, and we are using this experience to learn from our mistakes. Such as, all important file and equipment will be stored on the second floor. All we can do at this point is hope to minimize our losses if it were to happen again.

Suburban Lodge is strong and we will survive this, as I hope many of our members who had flooding damages such as our Master Mark Galloway. We are doing the restoration of the basement our selves in order to save some money. Insurance covered most of the damage, such as the \$8,850.00 repairs to the elevator and the \$10,000.00 clean up, and \$5,000.00 to the lost of the newsletter equipment. We have received some donations from some of the members that will be used to replace computers and office equipment. I would like to thank all who have pitched in to help with this effort.

Remembering that there was sewage on these papers, after scanning, they will be sealed in plastic bags and stored.

I want to thank the Lodge for notifying us as soon as there was a problem allowing us to salvage our most important history. We appreciate each member of the Lodge and the support that you give our Chapter. We wish you well in restoring the basement.

Order of the Eastern Star History of the Order

The history of the Order of the Eastern Star is divided into three Eras:

- 1. The First Era extended from 1850 to 1866, under the leadership of Dr. Rob Morris, Poet Laureate of Masonry.
- 2. The Second Era extended from 1866 to 1876, under the leader ship of Robert Macoy of New York.
- The Third Era extends from 1876, when the General Grand Chapter, Order of the Eastern Star, was established to the present time.

Of these eras, the first is perhaps the most important as it prepared the way for the other two.

The real origin of the Order of the Eastern Star, like Masonry, will always be shrouded in mystery. Many researchers believe it had a French origin as early as 1703. By some, this is claimed to be the first inception of "Female Masonry" or "Androgynous Degrees" -- (degrees for both men and women).

There appeared at this time, to be a demand for "Side Degrees" or Degrees conferred on ladies, and quite a list sprang up -- "Heroines of Jericho", "Danger in the Dark", "Tall Cedars of Lebanon", etc. These were extensively used but soon fell into decay for lack of lasting worth.

As to the real origin of the Eastern Star degrees in its Initiatory form, there is not the least shadow of doubt that the honor belongs to Dr. Rob Morris and its real origin comes under the First Era.

Dr. Morris had traveled many years. He had written many books on Masonry which are valued references in many Masonic Libraries.

Never quite satisfied that all the good in Masonry should be confined to men, Dr. Morris felt that Masonry should be for the whole family. But by the laws of that Ancient Order, women are not eligible for its degrees. Knowing he could not change the Ancient Landmarks of Masonry, Dr. Morris sought some method by which women could share with the Masonic Brother the same inspiration that "prompts man to noble deeds."

Although he harbored these feelings for years, it wasn't until 1850, while confined to his home after an accident, that Dr. Morris fully developed the Eastern Star Degrees in their present initiatory form.

During this time, he carefully thought out the symbolism and significance of the floor plan and the corps of officers. He conferred the degrees upon his wife and daughters, and some neighbors, presumably having an idea to clothe the ladies with certain words or signs whereby they might make themselves known to Master Masons.

These signs and so-called mysteries of the Order were communicated freely to all Master Masons and their relatives. Dr. Morris and other prominent Master Masons gave many lectures and conferred the degrees on many ladies throughout the nation.
