TEXAS STUFFED GRILLED BURGERS

"A great change to the usual grilled burgers. These burgers are stuffed with ham, cheese, mushrooms, and onions then slow grilled. Grill over hickory or mesquite wood if possible for better flavor! A sure family pleaser!"

INGREDIENTS

- 5 pounds lean ground beef
- 6 tablespoons Worcestershire sauce
- 2 teaspoons hickory seasoning (optional)
- salt and pepper to taste
- 2 cups chopped onion
- 2 cups chopped fresh mushrooms
- 2 cups chopped cooked ham
- 3 cups shredded Cheddar cheese

DIRECTIONS

- Preheat a grill for high heat. When the grill is hot, lightly oil the grate.
- In a large bowl, mix together the ground beef, Worcestershire sauce, hickory seasoning, salt and pepper until well blended. Make 20 balls, and flatten into patties. On one half of the patties, distribute the onions, mushrooms, ham and cheese. Carefully cover the piles with the remaining patties, making sure to seal all of the edges of the patties together tightly and enclose the filling.
- Grill the patties for 8 to 10 minutes per side, or until meat is well done, and cheese in the center is melted.






ROWLAND'S RAMBLINGS

When I was a teenager, like all teenagers, then and now, I was car crazy. I knew the name and the year of every vehicle on the road. Of course, there were only a few automobile manufacturers in those days, Ford, Chevrolet and Chrysler being the biggies. Like most kids, I

could tell the make and the year of an automobile from half a mile away. Also like *all* kids in the late 1930s and early 1940s, I didn't own one. But that didn't keep me from *wanting* one. I just *had* to figure some way to get my own wheels.

But my plans were interrupted when World War II came along, and I went into the Marine Corps right after graduation from high school. When I came out after the war was over I was still car crazy, and now I did something about it. I bought a 1930 Model A Ford, for the huge sum of twenty-five dollars. It had been wrecked, and looked terrible. The fenders and body were all banged up, and most of the window glass was broken or missing, but it ran good, and that was all I needed.

I took the entire body off: -- doors, fenders, running boards, hood, and windshield. I even took the seats out. All I had left was the motor and running gear, the frame, and the wheels. It had 19 inch wheels on the front and 21 inch wheels on the back. I cut a 55-gallon metal barrel in half, cut the side out of each half, bolted them to the frame, and put a cushion in each half barrel. Bingo! I had two seats to sit on.

I attached a piece of plywood to the frame in front of each seat to put my feet on, and I had the coolest vehicle in all creation. It was noisy, the exhaust fumes were smelly, it got you dirty, and it was great fun. Bugs coming at you at fifty miles per hour without a windshield taught me to keep my mouth shut when I drove. The roar of the uncovered, engine made it almost impossible to talk while driving. But all those were minor details. That was a fabulous car --- one of a kind --- a real eve popper. I sometimes even drove it in the rain, just so people would stare and shake their heads in disbelief at the idiot roaring by in a monstrosity that slung mud everywhere. All my friends wanted to ride in the barrel seats, but. I couldn=t get many girls to ride in it, especially after a rain. I learned how to make it backfire, and it sounded just like a gunshot. That was a real attention getter. And in a small town in Harlan County, Kentucky the police didn't bother me.

The A Model had a starter, but batteries were six volt and primitive, and sometimes didn't hold a charge very long, so the car also had a crank to turn the motor over if it became necessary. I sometimes *made* it necessary, even if it *wasn=t* necessary. It had a crank that stuck in a hole under the radiator that was connected to the motor All you had to do was give it a strong twist, and the motor would usually start. Sometimes it took three or four tries to get it started. I took great pleasure in stalling the engine right in the middle of town, grabbing the crank, hopping out, and cranking the engine to get it started again. I liked to have people stop and watch to see if I got it started. Sometimes this would hold up a car or two behind me, but that just made it more fun. After it started I would hop in, wave to everybody, and go rattling off.

You just could=t have more fun for nineteen cents a gallon for gasoline. Of course, I used the cheapest grade, because it made the car backfire better. It didn't have gauges, so I had to stick a stick down into the gas tank to see how much gas was in it. I always liked to do this in public too. And I loved to make a show of shifting the gear shift lever with my foot. Not everybody could do that.

There was no speedometer, but I told everybody it had two gears ---- high and fly, and offered to take them for a ride to prove it. The only takers were my friends who didn't care about mud or bugs, or people looking at them like they were crazy. I wanted to paint it purple, and call it "The Purple People Eater," but there was nothing to paint. I wanted to put a sign on it saying, AFree Taxi for Girls,@ but there was no place to hang the sign. Of course, there was no way to lock it, but nobody would have been stupid enough to steal the AMonster@ anyway.

But I didn't care what they called it. It was beautiful to me, and I had created it all by myself. But I couldn=t drive it at night; because it didn't have headlights or taillights. And when I parked it at night I had to take the cushions in the house in case it rained. You got a sore bottom bouncing around on the rough roads without cushions in the barrels. But I wouldn't have traded it for a Cadillac.

I created that monster for about thirty dollars. Today that's enough to buy about half a tank of gas. The good old days are gone forever. How sad!


